MALES GORMAN AND G. O'GRADY FIGHT TO DRAW

Dick Reed Kayoes Larry Holman in 2nd Round; Edmundson Wins.

Nath Gorman, Klamath Falls, light heavyweight, won a draw in his first round main event fight at the Klamath Falls arena last night.

Gorman was on the offensive throughout but could not score effectively. As he would come in, O'Grady would pump short lefts and rights to the face and body and then tie up the Klamath Falls fighter.

BERKELEY, Cal., April 12. (AP)—A light workout today, and crews from the Universities of Washington and California will be ready to meet tomorrow in their annual regatta—the classic of Pacific coast rowing.

Both crews are in perfect shape, and observers look for California to repeat its victory of the last two years. The varsity eight of the two schools appear equal in power, but the experience of the California men is expected to prove more of a handicap than the Huskies can overcome.

Coach Cy Ebricht, of the Bears, has revealed that the Bears have covered the three mile course in a shade below 15 minutes. Al Erickson of Washington, reports 15 minutes, 19 seconds as the best his crew has done.

The regatta, including races between the junior varsity and freshman eight of the two schools, will be held tomorrow morning.

"Boxing Czar" Badly Needed Says Dempsey

CHICAGO, April 12. (AP)—Jack Dempsey, promoter, is advocating a "boxing czar."
"What boxing needs to save it from decline is a supreme head, a man of action and power like Landis in baseball," Dempsey said. "Today, there are too many controlling boxing organizations and none is in agreement with the others, it seems."
"These bodies should get together. There is much to be done and a supreme head, with power enough to make final decisions, could life the game up to a higher standard."
Paul Prehn, chairman of the Illinois State Athletic commission and president of the National Boxing association, agreed with the suggestion.
"A good man with the power to carry out his ideas would be a great asset to the ring," Prehn said. "Today, there is too much difference in opinion. The various boxing organizations should get together, form a compact organization and work in harmony for the good of the game."

OILING WORK WILL RESUME

Oiling operations on the Dalles-California highway which have been forced to pause during recent inclement weather, will resume this afternoon, state highway officials said this morning.

RABID COYOTE ATTACKS GIRL

BEND, Ore., April 12. (AP)—With her throat torn by the fangs of a supposedly rabid coyote, Miss Marie Gordon, 17-year-old Silver Lake girl, was today awaiting arrival of serum being rushed here from the state board of health laboratory in Portland.

The wound is regarded as serious. Wednesday night, hearing a commotion in the poultry yard, Miss Gordon went to see what was causing the disturbance. She scarcely reached the yard when a coyote sprang at her, sinking five fangs into her throat. Aroused by her cries, the family went to her aid and the animal was shot. Porcupine quills were found in its body, which was taken as definite proof the animal was rabid, as coyotes rarely attack persons.

Dr. F. D. Striker of the state board of health in Portland expressed the opinion in a telephone message the coyote was rabid and asked that the skull be sent to the state laboratory.
