expenses, such as will be incurred through the duplication of lines, and the burden of a return upon unnecessary investments, must fall upon the people of the country or else poor service will be given and the investors lose all or part of their money.

"Southern Pacific believes that in its opposition to the proposed construction of the Great Northern and Western-Pacific between Klamath Falls, Oregon, and Reddie or Paxton, California, that it is responsive to this national railway policy, as well as executing its rights under the law to secure good wages and continuity of employment for its workers and protection for the large pioneering investment it has made on behalf of its stockholders."
