## CLEGHORN BACK TO MEET CLINE FOR 2ND TIME

Eskimo Indian Determined to Wipe Out Defeat Suffered Recently

Walter Cleghorn, heavy, tough, hard-hitting Eskimo, tonight has returned to Klamath to wipe out the defeat he suffered here in a month ago at the hands of "Tiger" Johnny Cline, San Francisco middleweight, in what has been classed as the greatest main event ever staged in Klamath Falls. The two fighters clash Friday night, April 19, at the Legion Memorial Hall.

He arrived Saturday night and on Sunday he was seen at the gymnasium. Early on the Sabbath he was seen on the road, and last night went four fast rounds with "Steam Boat" Jackson, but the game Spokane boy around the ring at will.

This morning he did another workout on the road and tonight at 6:30 o'clock will put on the gloves again at the Legion Memorial gymnasium.

"I suppose they think I'm giving out an alibi," the chunky Eskimo Indian commented this morning. "But the fact of the matter is I was not acclimated to the fast fight. I wasn't here long enough before the fight."

"This time, I'll have plenty of time to get used to the thin air and high altitude and I'm out to get Cline and wipe out that defeat."

Out After Cline. The Seattle main eventer meant what he said, too; that was apparent. He is a coming fighter and cannot afford to have a defeat on his record which is now wiped out by a subsequent victory.

"After the fight," Cleghorn went on, "I was in good physical shape for my last bout, but a little overweight. In fact I tipped the beams at 167 pounds which is too much for me. I'll jump into the ring this time at 155 pounds which is my best fighting weight."

"Cline's Good." "I'm not kidding myself about Cline. He's a good boy and I like him. But I also feel that I can put up a far more effective fight than the last one."

"Do you remember the seventh round of that fight. My manager told me to go out that round and end it. I put everything I had into my punches and smothered Cline for a minute or so. Then this thin air up here got me and I had to slow down. That won't be the case this time. When I get going I'm going to keep going until somebody drops."

Two Knockouts. Cleghorn apparently has been looking forward to this fight with considerable interest. He has been confining his ring activities to fighting around Oregon, in close proximity to Klamath Falls. The other night he knocked out Jack Ryan of Bend in the second round and a few nights later put over a kayo on Terry Kilson of Eugene in the fourth.

Tex Hickorstaff, promoter, said Cline was due tomorrow morning.

"I saw the 'Tiger' in San Francisco the other day," said Hickorstaff. "He's in great shape and told me he intended to slap over a knockout on Cleghorn this time. The fight will be even better than the last one, if that's possible."

Much Interest. Exceptional interest in the coming main event has been aroused among Klamath fans, principally because of the great battle the two middleweights put up at their last meeting. Both are main eventers in the big cities: Cline fought a main event in San Francisco a week ago, and Cleghorn has been fighting main events in Portland and Seattle for some time. There will be considerable betting with a surprising amount of Cleghorn money considering the fact that he was outpointed at their first clash.

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## EMANUEL AND HUCKINS WILL MEET TONIGHT

Barrister-Boxer Confident He Will Take Measure of Middleweight

LOS ANGELES, April 15. (A. P.)—Although he once tasted the bitterness of a knockout at the hands of a middleweight, Armand Emanuel, young San Francisco barrister-boxer, tonight again will try conclusions with another fighter of that class—Ace Hudkins, two-haired Nebraska "Wild Cat." They will meet at Wrigley Field.

Emanuel last year entered a San Francisco ring with Mickey Walker, king of the middleweights, only to be toppled into knockout oblivion by the jagged fists of the champion in two rounds. In tonight's scheduled ten round outdoor match with Hudkins, considered the leading contender for Walker's crown, Emanuel is confident the San Francisco debacle will not be repeated.

While Hudkins will concede Emanuel 12 pounds in weight, that is expected not to handicap him as much as half a score pounds of excess weight he is forced to carry in order to fight the San Francisco. Normally a 156 pounder, Hudkins will be forced to weigh in at 166 pounds this afternoon at 166 pounds even, a poundage he will make, many believe at the expense of speed. Emanuel is contracted to make 176 pounds.

Emanuel was a general 10 to 8 favorite to halt the rushes of the "Wildcat" with his jabbing left hand, and take the decision.

Giant James J. Jeffries, whose sledge-hammer fists ruled the heavyweight division two decades ago, will be the third figure in the ring during this struggle between little man and big man. A rate of approximately \$60,000 was expected by Jack Doyle, promoter.

REBEL PLANE FORCED DOWN IN BATTLE. MEXICO CITY, April 15. (A. P.)—Federal airplanes forced down a Rebel airplane manned by "two filibusterers" Tommy Carter and Arthur Smith, in an aerial battle south of Agua Prieta, Sonora, yesterday, the presidential palace announced this afternoon. The plane was wrecked. No information was given as to the fate of Carter and Smith, nor was their nationality stated.

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, April 15 (AP)—Pete Gavuzzi of England increased his lead on the elapsed time in C. C. Pyle's transcontinental foot race today by finishing in the 16th lap from Columbus to this control point in 6:28:15 hours. It was the fourth consecutive lap won by Gavuzzi.

BASEBALL CHALLENGE. NEW YORK, April 15. (AP)—A challenge by the New York Giants has been taken up with alacrity by Babe Ruth on behalf of the New York Yankees.

Members of the loyal Giants' boosters gave a dinner to John McGraw, manager of the Giants, at the Biltmore late night. Speakers insisted that the Giants would win the national league pennant and challenged the Yankees for the world's title. The radio carried forth the challenge.

A few minutes later, the telephone in the banquet room rang. Babe Ruth was on the other end with this message:

"I have heard you on the radio and in regards to that challenge—the Yankees accept with pleasure."

PIRATES, CUBS GIANTS, CARDS ARE FAVORITES

National League Opens Tomorrow With Four Out in Front

By HERBERT W. BARKER (Associated Press Sports Writer). NEW YORK, April 15. (AP)—The National League starts a fight tomorrow that won't be decided one way or another for six months or so. Some critics contend that the 1929 pennant won't be clinched definitely much before the closing day of the season, October 6.

In a league as well-balanced as the National, experts forecast the eventual result only at their own risk. Most of them have contended themselves with stating that four clubs—The New York Giants, Chicago Cubs, St. Louis Cardinals and Pittsburgh Pirates—are the outstanding contenders, so closely matched that no one of them can be selected as a favorite. This quartet is almost unanimously picked to take the first four places.

Differences of opinion creep in when an attempt is made to predict in what order they'll finish. Of the four, the Giants and Cubs have received the most preseason support. John McGraw, a driving leader of men, has a well-rounded team of Giants with good pitching and a powerful attack. Second base may prove to be the Giants' undoing unless

Andy Reese or Andy Cohen come through. With Joe McCarthy at the helm and Rogers Hornsby, league battler champion, at second base, the Cubs are looking for their first pennant since 1915 and many observers think they are going to get it. Much depends upon whether Charlie Root, crack right-hander can perform as he did in 1927.

Billy Southworth and Donie Bush, managers respectively of the Cardinals and Pirates, are in somewhat similar positions. Southworth has a new infield combination to work out and so does Bush.

The Cardinals plan to play Bottomley, Frisch, Gelbert and Haney in their infield. If this solves the problem Southworth's only worry will be over his aging pitching staff.

At Pittsburgh, Bush has Sheely, Bartell, Adams and Traynor for an infield and a worry. Outside of that the Pirates look extremely good. They have an unquestioned batting punch and as strong a pitching staff as there is in the league.

These four, then, should fight it out for the pennant unless the dope is all wrong, as it sometimes is.
