Witchcraft In 1929

ONE of the most amazing bits of recent news is the story from Allentown, Pa., telling how a young garage mechanic is accused of acting as a "hex" doctor in the case of a young girl who was poisoned.

It is weird enough to realize that "pow-wow" rites, witchcraft charms and so on can exist in a state like Pennsylvania in the year 1929. But there is something especially incongruous about the thought of an automobile repair man, of all people, acting as the dispenser of such hocus pocus.

Witchcraft and its allied arts date back into the very dawn of the human mind. The black art is still spoken of, in some backward sections of Europe, as "the old religion"; and the title is an apt one. Before written history began, the charms and spells that the Pennsylvania hexers used were in existence. To examine them is to take a glimpse into the dim infancy of the race.

The auto repair man, on the other hand, is the very incarnation of the machine age. He simply could not have existed at any other stage in history. He was brought into being by the automobile, and is as far removed from the day of witchcraft as anyone you can name.

And yet, if the Allentown authorities are correct, it was such a man who gave out charms and incantations for the suspicious believers in witchcraft!

The thing is symbolic, in a way. It illustrates the way in which habits of thought suited to an age that is dead are persisting alongside of new developments that call for an entirely new outlook on life.

The automobile is one of the machines that have changed modern life. It typifies them all; machines that have speeded the pace of existence enormously, that have put countless old social and economic customs in the discard, that have started the race on a new trail that can lead it to great heights or abyssal depths.

To get along in this new machine age we must advance mentally as much as we have advanced mechanically. We must learn how to make all of these machines work for our good and not for our harm. They are two-edged weapons; if we do not master them they will master us.

Most of the time we seem to be succeeding fairly well. But an incident like this at Allentown is disconcerting. Can ancient superstition of the darkest type exist side by side with the complicated machinery of 1929?

We are only halfway modernized. An auto repairman who performs incantations on the side is an extreme case, to be sure; but he is not fundamentally much more surprising than any other man who failed to realize that new conditions call for a profound mental readjustment.

The Newark Plane Crash

THE airplane crash at Newark, N. J., in which more than a dozen people were killed by the crash of a sightseeing plane, is the worst of its kind in the history of civilian heavier-than-air aviation in this country.

It is doubtful, however, if it will retard the development of commercial aviation greatly. It may check the enthusiasm of a few people, but it will soon be forgotten.

If you doubt it, consider the case of the steamboat. The early steamboats in this country were at least as dangerous to their passengers and crews as the modern airplane. Boiler explosions were tragically common; each one took a toll of lives.

Yet the steamboat was adopted in spite of the early dangers. It was needed, and the public insisted on having it. So, it may be predicted, it will be with the airplane. The tragedies will not be remembered long.

In this article representatives claiming to represent 93 per cent of the lumber industry of the county and that the chamber of commerce take a neutral stand regarding extension of the Great Northern railroad; or in other words to prevent the proposed popular vote of members of the chamber as a whole. Just a few years ago one of those who spoke appeared before a certain body and declared Klamath county was and had enjoyed one hundred per cent service in railroad facilities and the building of the Great Northern into Klamath Falls was not warranted.

At the present time believe the fallacy of this statement is apparent. Now it appears that there are eleven different firms named in the article. Shall that number of people control the actions of the chamber of commerce which is supposed to present all of the interests of our county?

According to current reports the chamber has previously decided to hear the arguments of the presidents of the Western Pacific, The Southern Pacific and The Great Northern railroad and then leave the question to a vote of all the members.

I predict the move was made to block this move. There are many of us believe that the endorsement of the chamber of commerce to the proposed extension would have considerable weight.

Also that after the timber of our county has been cut Klamath Falls will still carry on. That agriculture will continue to contribute to her welfare long after our timber operators have moved to other locations.

And as railroads are permanent fixtures I rise to protest that a small group of men should not presume to impede the progress of this great country of ours.

It will be apparent by the future course taken by the chamber on this question as to just what interests our chamber of commerce does represent.

HOOVER SENDS HIS MESSAGE

(Continued from Page One)

er to the season he had called primarily to deal with farm relief and the tariff.

The house membership followed the message closely and quietly until the clerk neared its end. There was applause, especially from the republican side, as this passage was read:

"In a large sense we have learned that the cheapening of the toller decreases rather than promotes permanent prosperity because it reduces the consuming power of the people."

Applause in the house became more general as the clerk droned off the last paragraph of Mr. Hoover's communications in which the president expressed the wish that except for reappointment, national origins and census legislation, the scope of the activities of the sessions should be held to farm relief and the tariff. When the reading was concluded the entire republican membership and half of those on the democratic side arose and applauded.

The brief session of the senate brought forth the first farm relief discussion of the extra session. Senator Watson, of Indiana, the republican leader, asked Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee, if a farm measure would be ready by Thursday. McNary replied the committee would introduce a bill then and would have a report ready by Monday. He said he expected to make the agricultural relief bill the unfinished business of Monday.

With a smile on his face Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, inquired of McNary if he expected a unanimous report from his committee. The Oregon senator said he did not know because the committee was still busy but he hoped for one.

Today's session lasted less than an hour, the senate adjourning within a few minutes after the gavel fell and the house closing its doors at 12:50 p. m.
