"TIGER" CLINE ARRIVES TODAY FOR BIG FIGHT

Warhorse of San Francisco in Good Shape for Main Event Friday

In the pink of condition, "Tiger" Johnny Cline, often called the "Warhorse," hopped off the train this morning and immediately began preparing for his return match next Friday night with Walter Cleghorn, Eskimo middleweight.

"The Tiger" appeared to be in perfect shape. He weighs 163 pounds, and has been keeping in condition by fighting, since his last appearance in Klamath Falls. He meets Cleghorn in the main event of a Legion fight next Friday night at the Legion Memorial hall.

Cline expressed surprise when he learned that Cleghorn had trimmed off nine pounds and weighed around 155 pounds.

Adel Weight

"I let myself put on a couple of pounds purposely," he remarked, "because I didn't want to spot him nine pounds as a kid the last time. But now, I understand, he has cut down."

"I guess we'll go into the ring weighting about the same," the San Francisco "Warhorse" was confident he could repeat his victory over Cleghorn, in spite of all the stories of Cleghorn's improved condition.

Tough Boy

"He's a tough boy and no mistake," the veteran of 250 fights remarked. "But I think I can beat him again. I'll try my best for a knock-out, but he's got a hard chin and I am told has never been knocked off his feet."

"His best punch, I discovered, is a left hook. They didn't tell me anything about that and I got a little hurt into it. Once he caught me a jarring blow, which up on the cheek and near the ear."

Will Watch Left

"But I'll be watching for it this time. I think I can beat him to the punch with my left. You know, I am a natural south-paw anyway and I'm pretty sure I've got a speedier left hook."

Cleghorn works out at 6 o'clock and Cline at 7 o'clock at the Legion Memorial hall tonight.

"But I'm not going to do any road work," the "Tiger" remarked. "It's been my experience that when one is in good shape he shouldn't overdo before the fight."

"One thing: I know I can take everything this boy has got. I've fought such boys as Dave Shinde, K. O. Phil Kaplan, Jimmy Duffy, Marty Farrell, Barney Smith, Kid George and so on, and those boys can hit, believe me. I've never been knocked out and when I am, I'm through with the fight game."

From Cleghorn's camp today comes the word that Cline will never be able to touch the Eskimo with his left as he did the last fight. The swarthy Alaskan seemed unable to keep out

The other two National league games were washed out when rain prevented Philadelphia meeting New York, and Boston from clashing with Brooklyn.

In the American division the St. Louis Browns defeated Chicago 2 to 1, while Cleveland won from Detroit by a 5 to 4 score in eleven innings. Rain postponed the Boston-New York game and the contest between Washington and Philadelphia.

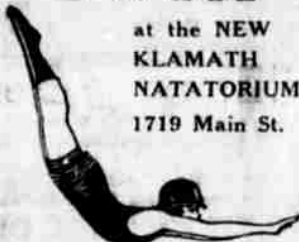
LODGES OF MEDFORD, ASHLAND TO VISIT

Game Patrol Station to Be Constructed

Building of a patrol station on Tule lake, which will possibly be located on the west side of the lake, early this summer, was announced today by George Tonkin, United States Game Protector en route home to Berkeley, California.

Two locations are being considered for the proposed building, one on the southwestern side near the Peninsula and the other on the west side.

The building will be large enough to accommodate four patrolmen.

"Natural food on the lake is just about exhausted," Mr. Tonkin told a Herald reporter today. "While geese and birds are able to feed at some distance, the mud hens are found to be going

out into the rocks where bunch grass is found."

"The condition is not serious, however, and warm weather will bring relief," Mr. Tonkin concluded.
