The two boys weighed exactly the same today, 158 pounds. Both are in perfect shape. Indications point to a packed house.

KEEP CHIN DOWN AND IN UNTIL BALL IS HIT

While watching the "pros" in action during the LaFayette open at Miami Beach recently, the thing that most impressed me was how every player kept his head down and his chin in and back of the ball until the swing was complete.

Walter Hagen in particular impressed me in this respect and possibly here in lies the greatest secret of a correct golf swing.

Grantland Rice recently said to me that he can't understand why the average golfer doesn't improve his game with the passing years.

"There must be something radically wrong with the teaching of golf," said Rice, "when players devote years of conscientious practice to the game and their game remains practically stationary."

This isn't so in baseball, tennis, football, etc. What's the answer?

Keeping the chin back of the ball, wrist action and balance are the great essentials in golf. Very few golfers make use of these principles and are not even in a position to learn them. Keeping the chin back and in is seldom taught in golf. Maybe it is the magic secret that will transform ninety shooters into seven-figure ones.

last night and under special permission sent to the printer. This described the new farm bill as only the first step in a program to aid the farmer and enumerated various other legislative proposals the committee plans to take up after the house has passed this bill.

While the senate committee still was in consideration the incorporation of the export debenture plan in the bill, the house definitely had turned thumbs down upon this proposal. In its report, the house committee declared it believed "that this program avoids the difficulties on which past legislation has been wrecked."

In addition to tariff revision and waterways development, the report listed among the other steps contemplated in the program for helping the farmer, legislation to license the shipping and handling of perishable products, improvement in the regulations of canning practices, the oleomargarine laws and the warehouse laws.

"We also intend to make a complete survey of the forestry program to which the government is already committed," it said, "with a view to determining whether this cannot be so operated without substantial additional expense to the government as to produce the withdrawal back into forests of lands which have been denuded of their timber and are now sub-marginal agricultural lands, thus at one and the same time reducing the surplus problem and aiding the reforestation of the nation."

ASSASSINATION OF KING BORIS IS FRUSTRATED

SOFIA, Bulgaria, April 18. (A. P.)—Police announced today they had frustrated an attempt to assassinate King Boris when he returns to Bulgaria, with discovery of two unexploded bombs in the king's private railway coach last night.

The bombs were of obsolete type but sufficiently powerful to have wrecked the railway coach, police said. Their statement added that they had received warning certain communists intended to take the life of the king if the bombs failed to explode.

O. JONES TRIAL JURY SELECTED

Selection of a trial jury which will sit in judgment in the case of State versus Oreville Jones, charged with burglary not in a dwelling, was completed to the satisfaction of state and defense shortly before noon today.

Three witnesses had been called for the state. Former Deputy Sheriff L. C. Mueller, Federal Probation Officer Clarence Worden and Chief of Police Keith K. Ambrose.

The case will be completed today even if it is necessary to call a night session, Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan indicated. The trial of Fred Swan, charged with murder, is scheduled to open tomorrow morning.

DISARMAMENT PLAN DOOMED

GENEVA, April 18. (AP)—The soviet scheme of extensive partial disarmament was doomed to rejection by the preparatory commission on disarmament today, but how to reject it sanely enough to prevent the Russians getting angry caused conference officials considerable worry.

The conference yesterday dodged an actual vote on the scheme itself but—at its sponsor's insistence—there faced the session late today debate and a vote on principles underlying it.

These principles were put yesterday by Maxim Litvinoff, soviet vice-commissioner for foreign affairs, in three questions of a supplementary nature, (1) whether the commission would express itself on the necessity of a reduction in armaments; (2) whether it favored reduction on the principle of proportion, and (3) whether it was ready to approve a mathematical coefficient as the principle of reduction.

RAILROAD OPEN

WASHINGTON, April 18. (A. P.)—Ambassador Morrow at Mexico City informed the state department today he had been advised by officials of the Southern Pacific railway that railway communications to San Blas were completed yesterday afternoon.

San Blas is in the state of Sinaloa near the Sonora border and recently was evacuated by the Mexican Rebel forces.
