

INVESTIGATION INTO DE KING DEATH SOUGHT

Three Angles of Prohibition Law Come to Surface at Legislature

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 13. (AP)—Three angles of prohibition poked their way from the tangled hills and resolutions in the state legislature today.

One dealt with the De King case at Aurora, in which Mrs. Lillian De King was slain by a deputy sheriff during a dry raid; another demanded a test of the federal government's right to regulate manufacture and sale of any alcoholic preparations other than intoxicating beverages. The third aimed at amending the state law to permit manufacture, transportation and sale of two per cent malt tonics for which federal permits have been issued.

Recognized dyes voted with wets in the house of representatives to approve, \$1 to \$5, a resolution to create a special committee to investigate the De King killing. The vote was preceded by considerable criticism of the manner in which the case has been handled, speakers demanding that the legislature through a special committee find out who may be at fault.

At least a dozen state representatives classified as dyes voted for the resolution, the point being made that this was not a wet and dry issue but one in which prohibitionists were as anxious as anti-prohibitionists to see justice done.

The second action involving prohibition centers around the Green resolution which directs the attorney general of Illinois to open a court battle of state rights in the regulation of medicinal liquors, sacramental wines, industrial alcohol and non-intoxicating beverages.

Chamber Selects Candidates for Board of Directors

With counting of ballots which nominated 16 directors for the chamber of commerce last evening at 9:50 o'clock, the names of E. H. Halsiger, John C. Boyle, A. M. Collier, W. C. Of this number eight will be elected to serve with the board of directors for the ensuing year. Each of the eight retiring directors were re-nominated.
