

FANATICS OPEN FIRE ON CAPS

caps deserted the car, deployed around the house and summoned reinforcements.

Surrounded

The place was soon surrounded by deputy sheriffs who shouted to D'Avall to surrender. But, shouting in Spanish: "My house is my castle," D'Avall and his wife replied by blazing away at the officers with a shotgun, 30-30 caliber rifle and .45 caliber automatic pistol. In an effort to frighten the couple, officers began firing into the air.

The couple ran out the back into a trench cut in the shape of a cross in the front yard and while D'Avall stood guard with his shotgun and shouted in Spanish, his wife performed some sort of fanatical ritual in which she tore \$5 and \$10 bills into confetti and showered herself with the bits. Officers who later gathered up part of the torn currency estimated that at \$200 was destroyed by the Indian woman. The couple then returned to the shack.

Use Tear Bomb

As darkness came on officers crept up to the house and threw a tear bomb through a window. The Indian couple ran out of the house before the bomb exploded and continued shouting. After the fumes disappeared they returned. Firemen were then called and streams of water were played in the shack for an hour, creating a miniature flood. Wringing wet, but undaunted, D'Avall and his wife replied with bullets and refused to come out. An officer wormed his way on the ground to the automobile which had been deserted, turned on the lights and fled. D'Avall went out and smashed the lights with the butt of his shotgun and went back in his shack. While other cars turned lights on D'Avall in an effort to blind him, Deputy Sheriff Tom Thompson attempted to retrieve the automobile. D'Avall opened fire with his shotgun wounding Thompson in the arm. He was taken to a hospital.

Firing Ceases

About midnight the firing ceased. Converting a truck into an armored tank with plates of sheet iron and crouching behind steel barrels, officers advanced to crash through the shack. They discovered the aged couple, wet but happy, sitting placidly in the trench. Explaining by sign language that he was out of ammunition, D'Avall and his wife cheerfully surrendered.

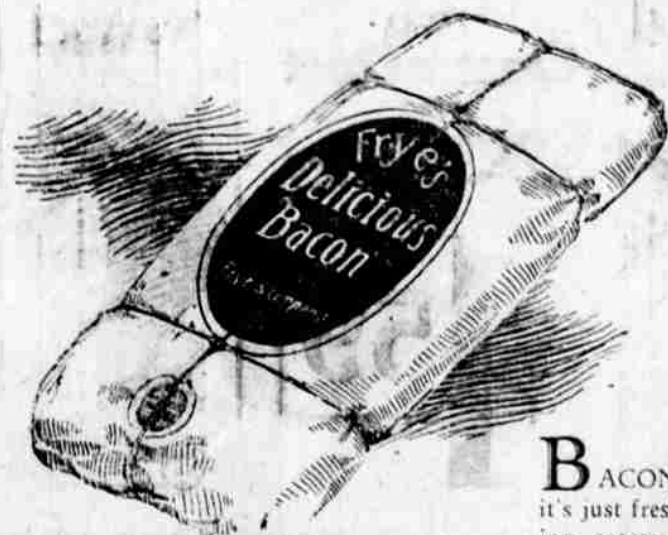
