Commissioner Rhoades

The Indian Bureau at Washington, D. C. has gone into new hands. Charles J. Rhoades, a Philadelphia banker, has been named to succeed Commissioner Burke, who resigned from the service.

There are few officials at the capital in which Klamath county is more interested than the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and Mr. Rhoades therefore will be an important individual to us.

Just now Secretary Wilbur is advocating a new policy for the Indians. He would cash their holdings, put the funds in trust and abolish the reservation, offering to the Indian a strong right hand but at the same time forcing him to stand on his own feet.

It is presumed that the Hoover administration is behind this policy and it is also assumed that the appointment of Commissioner Rhoades means that the new head is in harmony with the policy.

We have no disposition to argue against the administration policy, except on one point, and that refers to the fate of the pure-blood Indian, commonly known as the "blanket Indian."

Undoubtedly this nation owes him lasting aid. It may be sentiment, and it may not be, but somehow there is something swells within the American heart to prompt raising the protecting hand for the "blanket Indian." He should be cared for. Uncle Sam cannot properly set him adrift under the citizenship plan. He is a landmark and should be looked after.

It is different with the Indians carrying white blood. They can well be given their funds and close the chapter of governmental care. We believe most thinking Indians favor this plan. They know that to continue a foster father method over their people is not a good plan.

Commissioner Rhoades has some problems of size and he enters upon his new duties with the best wishes of all. The Klamath Indian will be found favorable, in most cases, to re-adjustment to the end that the government shall cease its stewardship, and therefore the Rhoades administration should be one that marks a great change in Indian affairs.

Disposing Of Old Autos

Where do all the old automobiles go to? Sooner or later, after passing through three or four used-car salesrooms, most of them hit the junk shops and are taken apart for the value of their material as scrap. But not all of them.

More people than you would think simply abandon old autos. In New York, 70 abandoned cars were picked up by the police in one day. They were old, ramshackle machines whose owners had simply parked them in the streets, removed the license plates and gone their way.

With more than 20,000,000 automobile owners in the country, this sort of thing might easily become a big problem. Yet even in the most ruinous old auto there is still a good deal of expensive steel and other metal. The engineer who can find a cheap way to salvage such material ought to be able to make a fortune.

No Sales Resistance

The plight of Walter Cyr, the young farmer of Concordia, Kas., who tried to commit suicide in order to escape from the attentions of a persistent life insurance salesman, is a matter that ought to appeal to everybody. The whole country is divided into two classes—those who are insurance salesmen and those whom the salesmen list as prospects. Each class should take a deep interest in the case of Mr. Cyr.

Cyr, it seems, had no sales resistance. When an agent approached he knew he would buy a policy. He knew, also, that he would let it lapse a little later. And he got tired of it. Finally, feeling himself on the verge of surrendering once more, he drank poison.

He's recovering now. And just what moral should be drawn from his story we haven't the faintest idea. Perhaps the insurance companies can suggest one.

THREE NATIONS MAY CONSIDER DISARMAMENT

GENEVA, April 20, (UP)—The possibility of a fresh naval arms conference between the United States, Great Britain and France arose today when Lord Cushendun, chief British delegate, asked the league of nations disarmament commission to defer consideration of naval arms limitation.

The commission is trying to prepare the way for a general disarmament conference, embracing land, air and sea forces. Lord Cushendun, in a speech before the commission today, expressed confidence that agreement could be reached in the league body on land and air armaments.

Delegates at once began discussing the possibility of a three-power naval conference, with America, Britain and France represented, after the British general elections. It was pointed out that if such a conference were successful, the league disarmament commission could hold a session late in September and incorporate a naval section into a general tentative agreement. This would permit a definite disarmament conference early next year.
