

Bleese Wants Investigation of 'Dry-Wets'

WASHINGTON, April 20. (U. P.)—Senators and congressmen apparently were undisturbed last night by the threat of Senator Bleese, Dem., S. C., to expose legislators who vote dry but drink intoxicants.

Similar threats have been made often before—recently by Former Senator Reed of Missouri—but none has ever been carried out. Reed said later he was only joking.

Bleese said he would demand a senatorial investigation of alleged drinking among congressmen and senators in their recent junket to Panama on the government ship Arcon.

"I'm going to insist that the American people know how many congressmen drank on that trip, how much they drank and how much liquor they brought aboard when the ship stopped at Port au Prince, Haiti," Bleese said.

STATIONS CUT PRICE OF GAS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20. (U. P.)—Resumption of the gasoline price war, which has disrupted the gasoline industry of the state on two occasions recently, was foreseen here last night when service stations announced a cut from 29 to 17 cents a gallon.

Charles Jacobs, field director of the retail service station dealers, charged the garage and property owners association of deliberately cutting one and two cents below the 29 cent price agreed upon. The latter denied this and was considering a further reduction below the 17 cent mark of its competitors.

CHICAGO GANG KILLS WITNESS

CHICAGO, April 20. (U. P.)—CHICAGO, April 19. (U. P.)—Extortionists exacted their penalty of "informers" today when Joe Perconti, who gave information in the kidnapping case of 10-year-old Billy Hanteri, was murdered at the door of his home in Joliet.

Perconti was the second victim of the alleged Mafia ring which kidnaped the Hanteri boy. Four months ago, Ole Scully was shot to death as he prepared to testify against the kidnapers.

Two sawed-off shotguns were found near Perconti's body. He had been decapitated by the assassins' fire.

Hope Is Still Held Out for Reparations

PARIS, April 20. (U. P.)—A secret meeting of the leading delegates of the reparations experts' conference was called suddenly in the suite of Thomas W. Lamont, member of the unofficial United States delegation, this afternoon in an effort to save the conference from complete failure.

The secret conference, of which Dr. Hjalmar Schacht of Germany, Mr. Josiah Stamp of England, M. Quessy of France, and Alberto Pirelli of Italy participated, was called after the German delegation made known a certain "change of attitude."

The final plenary session of the committee was postponed from today until next Monday because of the dramatic death of Lord Revelstoke, of the British delegation. It was believed in many quarters that this delay might give the Germans an opportunity to reach a compromise which would be accepted by the allies.

Dr. Schacht, who Thursday made an unqualified statement that there was no hope of Germany accepting the allies' offer, said today that the proposals he had presented to the conference were not meant as an ultimatum.

gans, including particularly, the feet.

Increased intelligence will bring larger brains, he said. The skull will probably be thinner because softer foods will reduce the stresses of mastication and remove the necessity for heavier bone structure. Man's head will be wider and higher, and it will have less hair upon it.

"The stature," he said, "promises to be even somewhat higher than today among the best nourished and least repressed groups. But there is no indication as yet that it may reach what today would be termed giantism."

"Due to prolonged life," Dr. Hedley said, "heart troubles, apoplexies, cancer and senile weaknesses of all sorts will tend to be more common until mastered by medicine."

"All this, with many abnormal social factors, will retard but not stop man's progress, for the indications are that he will rise to all his growing needs as they develop."

"There is no life-danger to humankind to be apprehended on these scores."

action that revenue measures must originate in the House and not in the Senate. He further alleged that allocation by the new board of all funds raised by taxation for the institutions of higher learning is contrary to the constitutional provision that requires the levying of every tax to be accompanied by a statement as to the purpose of the levy.

Other allegations of violation of the constitution are that the act is contrary to the 6 per cent tax limitation provision, and that the appointment provision conflicts with a constitutional prohibition against appointive offices being filled for longer periods than four years.

CHICAGO, April 20. (U. P.)—Hope was revived today that the trail of the St. Valentine day massacre slayers had been uncovered when Maj. Calvin Goddard, ballistics expert, began an examination of a machine gun taken by police in the home of a hoodlum a few days after seven men were slain in a north side garage.

The announcement was made by Coroner Herman Bundesen as the inquest into the death of the Moran gangsters was resumed.

"The gun was found in the home of Steve Oswald, known as a beer runner," Coroner Bundesen said.
