CHICAGO CUBS DEFEAT CARDS; PIRATES LOSE

George Uhle Leads Detroit to 1 to 0 Victory

Not that any one has denied it, but the time seems to have come for the experts to grant that Joe McCarthy's Chicago Cubs have something more than uniforms to prove they're baseball players and possible National League pennant winners.

Facing the St. Louis Cardinals at Chicago yesterday, the Cubs played bang-up ball behind Pat Malone's great pitching and won, 3 to 0, for their fourth victory in five starts. Holding the struggling Cardinals to five hits for his second victory of the season, Malone stretched the Cub pitchers' scoreless inning streak to 25.

"Old Pete" Alexander, puzzled the Cubs until the fourth when Hornsby, expected for a home run with the bases empty. After that they pecked away at the veteran with enough effectiveness to score single runs in the fifth and sixth innings.

After holding the Cincinnati Reds scoreless for six innings, Carmen Hill, best-speckled star of the Pittsburgh Pirates blew up with a loud report in the seventh and the Reds scored six runs before Romy Kremer could halt the carnage. The Reds added three more in the eighth to bring the final score to 9 to 4. Fifteen hits rolled off Red bats while Red Lucas was holding the Pirates to six. George Grantham didn't get any of them but he scored three times because Lucas insisted on giving him four consecutive passes.

Uhle in Good Form

In the American League, George Uhle pitched Detroit to a one-nothing shutout over the St. Louis Browns at St. Louis but he had some help from his mound rival, Jack O'Don. Jack's balk in the first inning coupled with two singles allowed the Tigers to score the only run of the game. Dale Alexander, big first baseman of the Tigers, was credited with driving in the tally, the 14th he has accounted for this season. That total incidentally leads both leagues.

In the only other major league game of the day, All Thomas gave the Cleveland Indians nothing that they could hit and the Chicago White Sox galloped away with a 10 to 0 decision. Thomas was touched for seven hits but he scattered them in such fashion that the Indians never got around to scoring a run. About half the Cleveland pitching staff tried to stop the Sox batting spree with a distinctly noticeable lack of success.

In a special match last night, K. Sugarman's counter jumpers took the First National Bank money-handlers into camp. The money-handlers were undefeated until last night, but the counter jumpers were hot and could not be beaten.

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SOVIET LEADER IS AGGRAVATED AT CONFERENCE

Mexim Litvinoff Receives Setback at Meeting

GENEVA, April 23, (AP)—Maxim Litvinoff, soviet vice-commissioner for foreign affairs, received another setback in the preparatory disarmament conference and it made him very, very angry. He did not immediately fulfill expectations of some that he would leave the conference, however.

Early in today's meeting the question of publicity for armaments, representing the German project, was disposed of by the disarmament commission by tabling it for reference to a sub-committee or later discussion in connection with limitation of effectives.

Shortly after the action was taken M. Litvinoff arose and demanded the right of speech. "I am very sorry," remarked M. Litvinoff, "but we absolutely must get on with our work."

Shortly after the incident the soviet delegation distributed a five page typewritten statement in which they said that while the commission's attitude justified their withdrawal from the conference they had decided to remain since they never wanted it to be said a disarmament conference had failed because the soviet had not participated.

They asked that the world be informed of the efforts of the soviet representatives to secure international disarmament by a sure and practicable means. They said they had decided to go ahead with the work of the conference although they thought it futile so long as the soviet proposals were ignored.

The statement closed with a charge that the majority of the governments represented on the preparatory commission were against any arms reduction whatsoever.

Patton Defeats Naval Ex-Champ

Boy Suicides; Feared Class Room Failure

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 23, (UP)—Fear of failure in his geometry class caused Fred Jones, 15, student of the local high school, to end his own life late last night.

"I cannot keep up with my geometry class," a note written by the boy and found by his parents read. "This is the best way out. I'm sorry."

The youth had left the note beside a geometry book, entered an adjoining room and fired a .32 revolver bullet through his head.

Another student of the school, Robert Johnson, 14, committed suicide two weeks ago.

Ready for Attempt to Fly From Tacoma to Tokio

TACOMA, Wash., April 23.—Harold Bromley, 29-year old war veteran, will hop off sometime in June in an attempt to fly from Tacoma to Tokio.

Backed by Tacoma businessmen, Bromley has purchased a Lockheed-Vega one passenger monoplane originally intended for the Williams Antarctic expedition. The plane is powered by a Wright J 6 motor, and is of all-wood construction.

Gasoline tanks in the wings can be emptied and sealed in 15 seconds, forming pontoons so the plane will float in case of a forced landing. The plane has been christened The City of Tacoma.

The flight will be approximately 4700 miles long. Tentatively,
