GIANTS LICKED IN OPENER AT POLO GROUNDS

Cardinals Tounce Ambitious Bruins; Yanks Take Trimming Again

The home opening of the season was a complete success for the Phillies. In full view of 25,000 expectant fans at the Polo Grounds yesterday, the fabled Phils installed the Giants for eleven innings, but finally romped away with the decision by 13 to 1 on Barney Friberg's triple in the final round with two aboard.

John McIlraw saw 20 of his troops die a horrible death upon the bases, 17 of them in nine innings. The home forces went down for the third time in the eleventh with three Giants filling away their time upon the bases.

Cards Win

Having failed to make any impression upon the Chicago defense in pitching battles, the Cardinals turned loose their heavy guns in the final assault and won from the ambitious Bruins by 8 to 4.

The Braves lost to the Robins by 3 to 2 in eleven innings, but even so, the defeat of the Giants left the Boston entry high and dry, clinging to a dashed hope to the top of the ladder with no disputant in sight.

The entire American league took hope at the further indications in the opener at Boston, the Yankees may just possibly be on the verge of a real, old-fashioned hitting slump. The world of champion took six small singles, three of them by that sterling slinger, Leo Durocher, and the Red Sox won by 4 to 2. George Pipgras was wild, but Fred Heilmann finished like a thoroughbred. Big Ed Morris refused to be dismayed at any time by the big Yankee bludgeoner.

Senators Win

The Senators applied the Shibe Park debut of the Athletics by taking a 4 to 3 victory in 11 innings. This untoward happening prevented Professor McGillicuddy from occupying the quarters upon which he has had his heart set for so long.

Instead, the Indians, who shaded the White Sox by 5 to 4, moved into the top floor, with the St. Louis Browns established, temporarily at least, in the quarters directly beneath them. The latest prank of the Browns took the form of an 11 to 6 victory over the Tigers in the final game of the series.

INDICTMENT OF GRY'S DEMANDED

GENEVA, Ill., April 24. (A.P.)—Indictment of three county officers and a dry investigator for the killing of Mrs. Lillian De King during a prohibition raid was demanded of a grand jury today.

Attorney R. A. Milroy of Aurora told the investigating body his version of the March tragedy in which six deputy sheriffs visited the home of Joseph De King in search of evidence of violation of the prohibition law.

During the raid Mrs. De King was fatally wounded, her husband's skull fractured and a deputy sheriff shot by the woman's 12-year-old son.

SEYBOFF HELD ON RUM COUNT

Federal Prohibition Officer Terry Talbot reports that he has arrested Peter Seyboff, formerly of Ill., on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway for possession and transportation of intoxicating liquor.

Talbot reports that Seyboff, arrested previously on liquor charges, allegedly was transporting 50 gallons of liquor from the valley into Klamath county. He was arrested in Jackson county and the charge will be filed in Medford, it is stated.

Major Battle Between Rebels and Federals Expected Hourly

MEXICO CITY, April 24. (A.P.)—News was expected hourly today of initial clashes near Maslaca, Sonora, between the principal rebel army entrenched there and federals.

Last reports from General Tamamontes, commanding 2,000 federal cavalry several miles in front of infantry and the main army said he had advanced cautiously as far as La M. 12 miles south of Maslaca, but had found no enemy.

He was advised to be careful of ambush and not to move too far ahead of the main army, but the 6,000 or 7,000 rebels at Maslaca and Sanantonio cut his horse to pieces before reinforcements arrived.

Moving of the principal federal column, containing more than 8,000 men with artillery and baggage was proving slow work, with further trouble on the newly constructed bridge over the Rio Puente, north of San Blas, Sinaloa, causing some delay.

With the gapposts of the two armies so close to each other, however, long delay in initiating the clash—in which General Calles hopes to repeat his devastating victory over the army of the north at La Reforma, Chihuahua—was not believed probable.

General Juan Rodrego Almazan, "hero" of La Reforma, sent word to Chapultepec castle that he was beginning the movement of his 10,000 troops through Pilipito Pass into Sonora, and would shortly be in a position to attack the rebel army at its rear.

General Calles' tactics involved inflicting a crushing defeat on the rebels at Maslaca and driving those left alive northward against the army of General Almazan, where "extermination" could be completed.

CONGRESS WILL CAST VOTE ON FARM AID PLAN

WASHINGTON, April 24. (A.P.)—Republican leaders in the senate have decided to make the vote on the export debenture plant a test of administration strength in that branch of congress.

Fortified by the expressed opposition of President Hoover to the proposal, Senator Watson of Indiana, made known that at the earliest opportunity he would give notice, as republican leader, of his intention to ask the elimination of the debenture section voted into the farm bill by the agriculture committee.

The senator decided upon this course after a conference with Chairman McNary of the committee, at which it was agreed that the administration leaders should use all their influence to obtain passage of a bill acceptable to the White House in view of the experience during the last few years in which differences between the executive and congress caused farm relief proposals to come to naught.

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Installation of "Talkies" At Pelican Started Today

Klamath is to have the "talkies." The latest type of installation as manufactured by the Radio Corporation of America, is now being installed in the Pelican theatre under the supervision of the engineers assigned to the Pacific Coast for this work. C. R. Underhill arrived in town yesterday along with a half-carload of intricate machinery which represents the Phonophone installation of sound reproduction both from sound on film and the disc method.

Phonophones as manufactured by RCA is a development of all the combined sound engineers of the Radio corporation, Westinghouse, and General Electric.

Despite the fact that the Pelican projector plant is virtually new, it must be removed and complete new picture machines installed to accommodate the sound equipment. In addition, the new picture equipment, the back part of the auditorium must be remodelled to care for 30 parabolic incident to the showing of "talkies."

A control board that will make the projection room take on the aspect of a broadcasting station, a bank of storage batteries, two three-blade direct-current generators, and the new machine necessitate this change in construction.

The principle of phonophone in the photo-electric cell, which amplifies light; this amplification rises to over the six million figure, and the outfit in the Pelican will be sufficient size to accommodate an auditorium seating 5,000 persons.

The speakers are of two super-dynamic size, eight in number, 12 inches in diameter and placed on the stage alongside the screen, at such angles to give the effect that speech comes directly from the actor's lips.

The exact opening date of the Pelican with "talkies" has not been decided upon because of the changes in the building and the need of night.
