Horton Smith, the 29-year-old Joplin, Mo., professional, has been fairly burning up the western and southern golf courses this winter. His latest achievements were winning the North and South Open Golf tournament with a 283, taking the \$5,000 purse from a field of the nation's most prominent exponents of the game.

While on the subject of super-athletes in any line I have often wondered if a super-pitcher in baseball comparable to Babe Ruth in the home-run field will ever be developed.

I mean a real super-pitcher even better than Mathewson, Johnson, Cy Young, Rube Waddell and Alexander—a giant with so much stuff that he could literally throw the ball past a batter—a fellow who could win forty games a year with a tail-end team.

The idea is an interesting one. I wonder when the Babe Ruth of the pitchers will ever appear on the scene or if such a super-pitcher is physically possible.

producing sections there will be a decrease in potato acreage, while there will be an increase in new agricultural sections, such as Tule lake.

Sowing of wheat is practically completed in the southern end of the county and will be finished in other sections of the basin in the near future. Cold weather retarded sowing to some extent.

Rye is nearly all sown and some oats and barley have been seeded.

An interesting experiment will be conducted this year to determine what is the best time to plant potatoes—in fact, the experiment is already underway.

It comprises the planting of potatoes in Mt. Laki, Henley and Malin sections at ten-day intervals between April 19 and June 19. Results of these plantings, it is hoped, will give farmers the key to the important question of when it is the best time to plant and how early it is possible to plant.

Reports which have come into the county agent's office indicate that extreme cold last winter resulted in the freezing out of some alfalfa and clover crops, particularly those which were seeded last fall.

General conditions, Mrs. Henderson said, pointed to a successful year for Klamath agriculture.

HEAVY TOLL OF FISH TAKEN BY PELICAN FLOCK

Great flocks of white Pelicans are taking heavy toll of fish life in the Williamson river at the Wilson rifice, below Chiloquin, according to word received here today.

Approximately 500 of the big birds assemble at the rifice late each afternoon to stage Pelican "drives," in which the picturesque birds drive a school of fish into the shallow water and then gorge themselves.

Whether trout or suckers are suffering the most from the feathered fishermen could not be ascertained.

GOVERNOR WAS 'FRISKY' CLAIM

BATON ROUGE, La., April 25. (AP)—Testimony that Governor Huey P. Long sat on a divan with a girl Hula Hula dancer on his lap and a glass in his hand the night the Louisiana National guard raided alleged gambling places near New Orleans on his orders was heard last night by the Louisiana house of representatives.

Five impeachment counts against the youthful executive were voted late yesterday, and previously two other charges had been certified to the senate, which will try him.

Testimony on the alleged Hula Hula party was given in connection with the charge against Long of gross misconduct in public places. M. D. Danziger, president of the New Orleans association of commerce, was host at the party given on the night of February 13, at an apartment in the French quarter.

The entertainer, Helen Clifford, said she danced the Hula Hula, and sat on the governor's lap as she finished a number. "About a minute. He had his arm about my neck," she declared.

She said she saw the governor drink and "later he got very frisky" and "danced with a glass on high and a hand in his pocket." Most of the time "he was on a settee with a woman, she asserted, and added in response to a question that "he played with her hair."

STOCK PRICES RECEDE TODAY

NEW YORK, April 25. (AP)—The ghost of higher redoubt rates stalked across the financial horizon today and stock prices turned reactionary despite the sporadic efforts of pools to revive the "bull" movement. A sprinkling of industrials, rails and specialties were lifted to new high ground in the early buying movement. But the general list was under steady pressure. Declines in the active issues ranged from one to five points, with a few high priced specialties recording much larger losses.

Widespread rumors that the New York federal reserve bank would increase its discount rate after the close of the market, and that brokers' loans would show a larger increase, were behind the selling movement.

BEACON SITES ARE SELECTED

MEDFORD, Ore., April 25. (A. P.)—The selection of sites for the thirty-five beacon lights between Delta, Calif., and Drain, Ore., for protection of planes flying the night air mail, has been made by the aeronautical engineers of the department of commerce. Night flying is scheduled to start June 1.

For the Medford division between the state line and Drain, the sites are: Barron emergency field at the foot of the Siskiyou, Dumas Butte, Valley View, Medford airport, Gold Hill, Grants Pass, atop Sexton mountain, Groove Creek, Wolf Creek, Stage Coach Pass, Cowcreek field, John's ranch, Canyon mountain, Missouri Bottoms near Riddle, Weaver Hill near Myrtle Creek, Nebo mountain near Roseburg, Roseburg, Airfield, Wilbur, Sutherlin, Rice Hill, Oakland, Yoncalita and Drain.

The northern California sites are: Delta, Lamoline, Glume Creek, Dunsuir, Shasta, Weed airport, Cayelle, Montague, Hornbrook, Siskiyou, Yreka, and Siskiyou.

Seven beacons to burn gasoline will be installed at isolated points.

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CREW RESCUED ON HIGH SEAS

NEW YORK, April 25. (AP)—After floating nine days in a life boat ten members of the four-masted schooner James E. Coburn, which foundered April 17, 250 miles north of Bermuda, were picked up this morning by the yacht Amida. The Amida also picked up the body of the cook of the schooner, who died last night.

News of the rescue was received in a wireless message by the Radio Corporation of America.

Gertie Henry was awarded a default judgment of \$700 today against Annie Lynch following a brief jury trial this morning.

GREEN SEEKS THIRD TRIAL

MARSHFIELD, Ore., April 25. (AP)—Misconduct on the part of state witnesses and irregularity in jury proceedings during the last trial is alleged by attorneys for Robert Green in a motion for a new trial filed at Coquille today.

Green is in the state penitentiary under life sentence for the slaying of Caleb Greene on November 21, 1927, having been sentenced after conviction of second degree murder in his second trial.

Head injuries rendered him unconscious, and his hip was injured when he fell. Examination this morning, however, showed there were no fractures.

POLICE CATCH "KING" RIKER

SAWTELLE, Calif., April 25. (AP)—"King" William E. Riker, accused by Mrs. Evelyn Rosenkrantz, a San Quentin convict, of killing Mrs. Margaret White in Palms, Calif., in November, 1927, was taken into custody by police here today. Riker denied all charges and said he did not know Mrs. White, although he admitted an acquaintance with Mrs. Rosenkrantz.

what a few hours before had been their farms. Women with babies, little children with bewildered expressions, and men sadly pondering the loss of all they had stood beside wagons or automobiles containing what possessions they could save. They were the ones who refused to abandon faith in the dikes while the more cautious ones were moving their belongings to safety.

From the river, looking in toward the district, one saw nothing but water and partly submerged houses. The dike break at close range looked like a raging rapids, sucking in the water from the Mississippi which swept along in its main channel at least 12 miles an hour.
