Barnard, attorney and past state commander of the American Legion, for trial on charges of conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition law.

CHICAGO, April 25. (U. P.)—John Wildman and his estranged wife, knelt beside the body of a mutual friend. Only when Wildman had finished his silent prayer did he realize that the wife, who had left him three months ago, was kneeling at his side.
In Mrs. Wildman's arms was their boy, Robert. He moved as though to caress the child. Mrs. Wildman arose quickly and left the room.
Some men walking thru an alley that night stumbled over a rifle. Then they came to a man's body—John Wildman's body.
Baby Robert's birth certificate was stripped in death fingers. Upon it, in the shaky handwriting of John Wildman, was written: "This is all I have."

RANCH WORKERS ARE EXECUTED

MEXICO CITY, April 25. (U. P.)—Four ranch employees near Dolores Hidalgo, state of Guanajuato were forced to dig their own graves and then were executed by a band of 30 bandits, according to dispatches to the newspaper Gráfico tonight.
The reports said the band was headed by Jose Guadalupe Lopez. The band captured the ranch workers and found them guilty at a court-martial, executed them for "stealing grain from small farms."

Aviator Leaps Successfully From Airplane

WASHINGTON, April 25. (U. P.)—Mr. Mail Pilot Vernon E. Treat leaped from his plane in a parachute shortly after taking off from Bolling Field last night when the plane developed motor trouble and crashed. Treat was uninjured. The accident occurred on the Maryland side of the Potomac river ten minutes after the plane left on the south mail trip.

First reports of the accident came from two girls who resided in Alexandria, Va., police they had seen a man leap from a plane in a parachute and that the plane crashed in flames. Air mail headquarters denied, however, the plane burned, saying Treat called on the telephone after the accident asking for a mail truck. He told them he was unhurt.

FREEZE OIL MAN.

NEW YORK, April 25. (U. P.)—A grand jury decided today that Samuel E. Bell, Baltimore oil man, should not be indicted for manslaughter in connection with the death of Arthur M. Smith, wealthy Cleveland, Smith and Bell had a dispute after a party regarding escorting Mrs. E. L. Brown, Lexington, Ky., society woman, home. Bell was accused of pushing Smith, who died of a fractured skull.

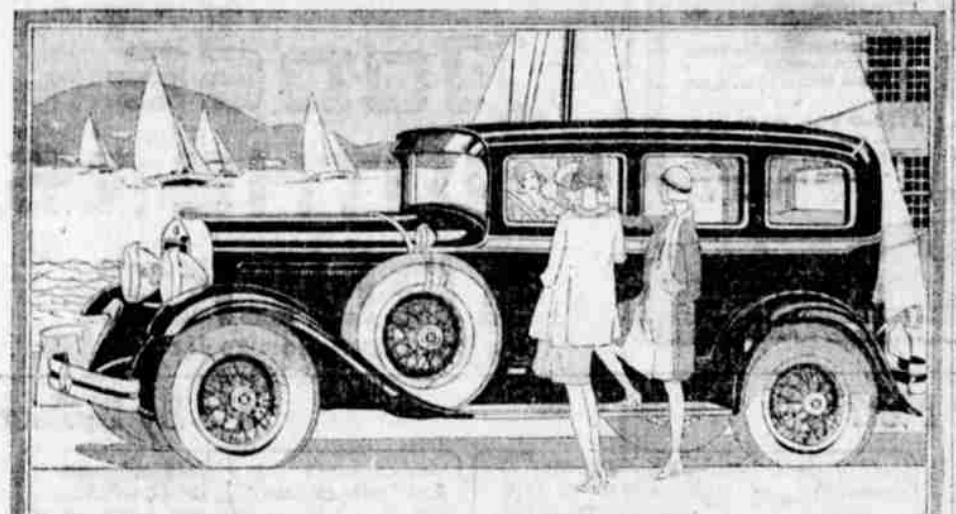
