## FEDERAL ROAD BUREAU PLANS NEW HIGHWAYS

Over One Million Will Be Expended in State of Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., April 25. (UP)—New projects and completion of several under way in various parts of the state are assured with the announcement today that the federal bureau of public roads will spend \$1,296,000 in Oregon during 1929.

W. H. Lynch, district engineer, said the bureau will spend \$629,000 of federal highway funds and \$660,000 in co-operative funds.

A total of \$689,000 has been set aside for construction of Willamette Valley-Florence road, which may take several years.

Work is under way on construction of a forest highway section of the Roosevelt highway south of Newport, between South Beach and Beaver Creek, and \$125,000 has been pledged for construction of 5.3 miles more to Alsea Bay.

A contract will be let for surfacing the east 13.5-mile section of the Mt. Hood Wapinitia road at an estimated cost of \$137,000. A total of \$75,000 has been set aside for paving a six-mile section of Salmon river road which connects with a stretch built by the state out of Grand Ronde.

Funds aggregating \$40,000 have been appropriated for surfacing an additional six-mile section of the Heppner-Spray route.

Improvement of the Canyon City-Burns route will be continued this year at an estimated cost of \$109,000. Work is under way on widening the Oregon Caves road and \$60,000 will be available for reconstruction of the Mt. Hood loop.

## Prohi Skipper Sent to Jail for 2 Years

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25. (UP)—Two years in federal prison was the sentence administered to Sigvard B. Johnson, former skipper on the coast guard cutter Cakokila, here today, for perjured testimony in the trial of sailors on the rum ship Coal Harbor.

In passing sentence Federal Judge A. F. St. Sure reprimanded Johnson as a man "who might have sent 14 British seamen to jail and caused serious international complications between this country and Great Britain."

United States Attorney Hatfield pleaded for leniency, claiming he himself was not convinced that Johnson was not acting "under direction of his superiors in the matter."

Testimony of Johnson at the trial was that he had not taken radio bearing before the seizure and did not know the Coal Harbor was beyond the 12 mile limit. He later admitted he had secured the bearing which showed the seized vessel was 23 miles off the coast.

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## False Arrest Is Charged by Local Woman

Suit for a total of \$13,000 damages was filed yesterday in the circuit court by Mrs. E. K. Thompson against Gus Dunn and Harry D. Bolvin, deputy district attorney, whom she charges with willfully, wrongfully and maliciously prosecuting her on a criminal charge.

She was charged, the complaint states, with being in unlawful possession of certain white gold wedding rings and white gold ring mountings which the complaint alleged belonged to Gus Dunn, a jeweler.

Officers once searched her home and person and failed to find the property, she states, and asks \$2,500.

Again the officers came and arrested her and put her in jail where she remained for two or three hours until she was released. She employed an attorney for \$150 and later charges were dropped. She asks \$5,150.

The charges, arrests and the trouble have caused her mental anguish and injured her reputation, she alleges, and she seeks the damages asked.

Bolvin was acting in his official capacity of assistant district attorney. James Bacon is attorney for the plaintiff.

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
