

PENNSYLVANIA ATHLETE WINS

Outstrips Negro in Relay Carnival Decathlon Championship.

FRANKLIN FIELD, Philadelphia, April 26. (AP)—Gathering headway after a slow start, Barney Berlinger, Pennsylvania's great all-around performer, overcame Everett Litterback, University of Pittsburgh negro, and led by more than 100 points after five of the ten events had been completed today in the Pennsylvania relay carnival decathlon championship.

Berlinger captured two of the first five events, the shot put and high jump, amassing 281.34 points, to assume a commanding position in the field of nine contenders for versatile honors. Litterback, who started off by winning the 100 meter dash and broad jump with fine performances, slipped back a trifle but held second place recently with 250.746 points by also capturing the 400 meter run.

Tom Churchill, University of Oklahoma giant, occupied third place with 248.63 points. Charles Coeb of Georgetown was fourth with 231.76, and Robert L. Todd of Indiana fifth with 203.21 points.

Two records for the carnival decathlon were broken, the first by Litterback when he leaped 22 feet, 1 7/8 inches in the broad jump and the second by Berlinger when he tossed the 16 pound shot to a distance of 44 feet, 6 inches.

SEVERAL CARS SHRINERS WILL VISIT MEDFORD

Professor to Give Talks on Bible Topics

A series of short lectures on present day bible topics will be held at the Seventh Day Adventist church at 522 Ninth street by Professor G. E. Johnson, beginning Sunday night at 7:45 o'clock. It was announced today.

Professor Johnson is an educator of some note having acted as principal or bible teacher in several academies as well as other schools, both public and private in most of the states of the northwest.

While acting as bible teacher, Professor Johnson noticed the very accurate fulfillment of bible prophecy by present-day events—especially the World war and the events now leading up to the "next war" as so many prominent men choose to term it. He became so interested in this and other bible lines, that he left the school room and began lecturing on these themes. Since doing so he has lectured in many of the larger cities of the northwest, including cities in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

Besides the lecturer, Mr. Johnson, the church has secured, along with local talent, the services of Frances V. Johnson, who has recently arrived from Tacoma, Wash., and has opened a studio in the I. O. O. F. building.

The series of lectures will last for several weeks.

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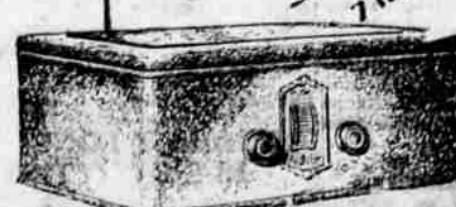
