FORBES SIGNED TO MEET CLINE IN MAIN EVENT

Los Angeles Main Event-
er Will Clash With S. F. "Tiger"

A main event which promises to excel even the two great fights between "Tiger" Johnny Cline and Walter Clegg, has been signed for the next card in Klamath Falls, Friday, May 3. It was announced today by Joe "Tex" Bickerstaff, promoter, Frankie Forbes, sensational Los Angeles middleweight, who has been fighting regular main events in Portland for the past six weeks, will meet Cline in the Legion Memorial hall ring.

That Forbes is a "big timer" is apparent from his record. He will probably give Cline a harder fight than Clegg was able to produce—Cline licked Clegg in their first meeting and battled him to a draw the second time they met.

Forbes is already in Klamath Falls training for the bout and is in great shape. He may have to give away a few pounds to Cline. "But that doesn't make any difference," he said. "I'll spot him a little and give him a nice trimming."

Forbes is 23 years old and has been fighting for two years. Unlike most fighters, he did not start in as a preliminary boy. The first fight, he ever had was a six round special event and from specials he climbed up to semi-finals and on up to main events.

After fighting regularly in California for a year or so, he decided to invade Oregon. Joe Levy wanted to see him in a semi-final before he gave him a "big shot," and matched him with Johnny McCoy of Seattle. It took Forbes just 30 seconds to knock McCoy flat as a pancake.

Portland tandem went wild about the Los Angeles flash and so Forbes was matched in a main event with Frisco McGale. He beat McGale by a wide margin. His popularity in Portland brought him another main event on the next card, with Ray McQuillan—the same negro pugilist who defeated Benny Dotsen and Del Allen in Chiloquin in main events. Forbes dominated McQuillan twice in the second round and won handily the rest of the way.

Bickerstaff has just returned from Portland where he has been conferring with Joe Levy, Portland matchmaker. "Levy helped me a lot in signing up good boys for future fights," Bickerstaff said. "Klamath fight fans owe him a lot in helping me get lined up with good boys."

Forbes has a fine record in California. He has fought such boys as Jack Spar, Dick Hoppe and knocked out Harry Gatum who has two knockouts over Sammy Baker to his credit.

The rest of the card looks good. Billy Breedlove, sensational Bend lightweight who won his last fight here over the knock-out route, meets Leo Lomelli, hard hitting and clever Portlander.

Billy Church, who gave Jack Breedlove such an unmerciful beating here recently, meets Johnny McCoy. "Steam Boat" Jackson will go on with some unnamed opponent.

The veteran "Tough" Wing is in town looking for another Klamath fight—he fought here once before, getting a draw with Kewpie Riley.

"I want a fight here," Wing said, "and if it breaks right I'll stick around here for some time."

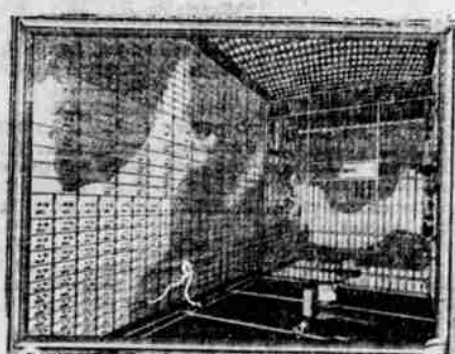

and William Hornblower, two of the managers, carried this thought when they declared last night that District Attorney Barton Pitts of Los Angeles should reopen investigation of the "kidnaping hoax."

The 1926 probe was dropped by Former District Attorney Asa Keyes with the announcement that Lorraine Wiseman-Sielaff, on whom he depended for information and testified in the impeachment trial, changed her story so frequently that he could not ascertain what the status of his evidence was.

Not Presented
When Joseph Ryan, Los Angeles attorney and Deputy District attorney under Keyes, testified in the impeachment trial, he declared that evidence given to his superior relative to the McPherson case was never presented to the grand jury.

The assembly managers contended that some of Ryan's testimony might aid Pitts if the latter reopens the probe. Some of the legislators expressed themselves today as dissatisfied with the senate's action in acquitting Judge Hardy. Not that they felt members of the upper house had considered the matter too lightly for the evidence and law involved were discussed for nearly six hours after the verdict was rendered.

Work for Acquittal
But during the past week reports have been current in the capitol that lobbyists were busily working for acquittal. Legislators, including certain members of the board of managers, declared they were interested in the situation to the point of ascertaining whom these lobbyists represented.

Steps may be taken in the senate or assembly during the coming week to institute an official investigation of the reports, the legislators declared. They declined to be directly quoted until the action is taken.

LOS ANGELES, April 27. (AP)—District Attorney Barton W. Pitts declined to comment on reported statements of the assembly board of managers that the entire Almee Semple McPherson case should be reopened for investigation and the matter placed before the grand jury. "Until I have given the matter additional consideration and have studied the entire transcript of the testimony and all the proceedings in the impeachment trial of Judge Hardy, I do not care to discuss the future moves of this office in the McPherson matter," Pitts declared.

DES MOINES, April 27. (AP)—Gus Sonnenberg retained his world's heavyweight wrestling championship last night by throwing Charles Hanson of Omaha in 27 minutes, 6 1-2 seconds with his famous flying tackle.

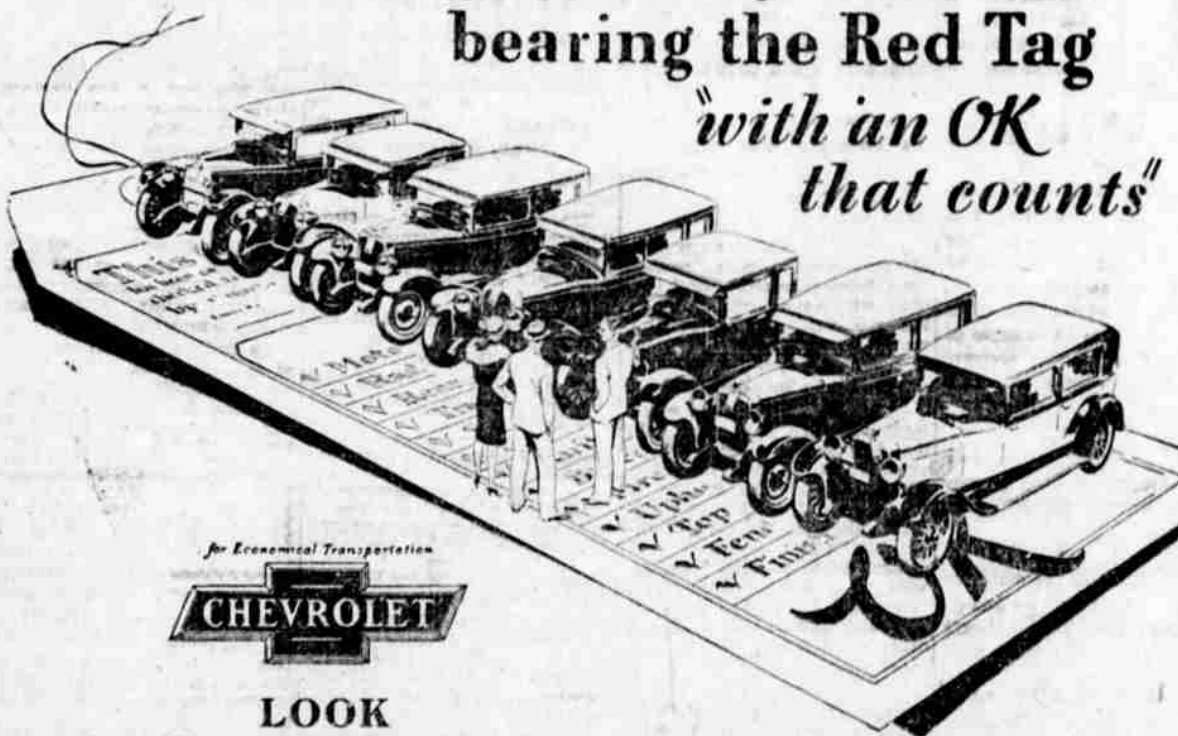
