first place in the state finals of the national oratorical contest here last night. His oration was titled "The Constitution Today."

Manch "E. Gadiwa, 16, junior in Pendleton high school, was second in the Oregon finals. Arthur Busse of Lincoln high was third.

Fourth place went to William Dougherty of Medford; fifth to Hagan A. Moore, Ontario; sixth to Miss Julia Metcalf, St. Helens Hall, Portland; seventh to Miss Mabel Moore, Klamath Falls, and eighth to James Brooke, University high, Eugene.

Thibault will go to Los Angeles to represent Oregon in the Pacific coast finals of the national contest. He received a cash prize of \$125 offered by the Oregon Bar association, and a gold watch valued at \$100, presented by W. M. Davis, president of the Bar association.

Gadwa, second place winner, received a cash prize of \$50, and Busse won a check for \$50.

The judges are said to have experienced considerable difficulty in deciding between Thibault and Gadwa. The first ballot gave Thibault three firsts, and Gadwa two. But a peculiar situation existed, that although Thibault had three firsts, he was behind Gadwa under the "low point" system of judging. Under the rules this required that the judges be called together to cast ballots. They did this and Thibault won the majority vote.

Thibault was the last speaker of the evening.

REBELLION IS NEARING CLOSE

ed. The rebel generals fled to the border and were here today. American passengers on a train from Guaymas brought news of the fall of Navaoja under an assault by the advancing federalists led by General Lazaro Gardenas. The Bank of Mexico building and several private residences were damaged by the federal bombs. Rebel forces were reported retreating toward the border.

Mexican women, some of whom were wounded, arrived at Naco 36 rebel soldiers had been killed and many others wounded in a federal air raid on the rebels hill camp near Lamorita, Sonora. The federal announced the capture of six rebel officers, several hundred men and several troop trains with arms and ammunition. Federalists took the town of Buenos Aires, where 100 rebel cavalrymen were reported to have surrendered.

across in 24 hours or so in an air liner.

Before the trans-Atlantic flying service is started, Chapman said, the company will establish an air service on land. This will be done within a year, he said. Twenty passenger planes will be used.

"Suppose a passenger on the Leviathan or the President Roosevelt gets a radio that his mother is dangerously ill in Chicago," Chapman said. "We shall be ready to care for him. When the ship docks one of our big passenger planes of the United States lines will be waiting to land him in Chicago in seven or eight hours."

"Eventually we shall extend this land plane service to the Pacific coast if necessary."
