Sell The Bonds

EVERY citizen who has kept an observant eye on the public purse rejoices at the opportunity given to Klamath Falls to cash in on its O. C. & E. railroad bonds and, at the same time, stop that depressing drain from the treasury which has averaged \$50 a day for ten years.
At this time, there is no good purpose in re-hashing the O. C. & E. bond question. Suffice to say the city made a very bad investment and has paid dearly for it ever since.
There should be no question in the minds of thinking citizens on what course to take when the proposition is submitted to the electorate. The bonds should be disposed of and the receipts of the sale placed in the bond sinking fund to help reduce the city's indebtedness.
The O. C. & E. railroad is essentially a feeder line and it is axiomatic that justification for the existence of feeder lines is only the business they develop for main line railroads. Thus it would be poor judgment for the city to retain these bonds in the hope that under new ownership, the 60 mile railroad would be a paying venture.
The question that the voters must ponder on is which of the two propositions submitted by the Great Northern and Southern Pacific shall be accepted—whether the city should accept \$150,000 in cash or whether it should take \$50,000 in cash and the O. C. & E. railroad Seventh Street property.

the rear car of the elevated train. About half the injured were hurt in the scramble to get out of the wrecked train and were allowed to go home after being treated by ambulance surgeons and at hospitals. Twenty persons, however, suffered fractures, ranging from arms and legs to spines and skulls, and were taken to hospitals for emergency treatment.
For hours after the collision, even after the wreckage had been cleared away and traffic resumed, hundreds of persons stormed the Highbridge police station seeking news of relatives or friends they believed might have been on one of the trains.

HOOVER SPEECH COMMENDED BY LEGION LEADER

PORTLAND, April 29, (AP)—Paul V. McNutt, national commander of the American Legion, and dean of the law school at Indiana University, thinks President Hoover's address on disregard for law was "a most startling statement."
"You cannot make people good by law," McNutt declared here yesterday. "I have a feeling that the average citizen has no disregard for the law, but that he is dissatisfied with the way it is administered. After all, the real thing that is needed is social justice."
"But President Hoover said that everyone realizes the truth," McNutt commented. "While everyone realized it, no other high official had the nerve to tell it."

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Prohibit After Death" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 28.
The Golden Text was, "He that followeth after righteousness and mercy findeth life, righteousness, and honor" (Prov. 21:21).
