

REPORT SHOWS COPCO GROWTH

Quarterly Statement of Earnings Reflects Sat- isfactory Increase

The consistent growth and development of the California Oregon Power company is indicated by the regular quarterly letters accompanied by dividend checks on Copco Preferred Stock which have just been distributed to over 4,500 shareholders of the company, many of whom reside in this locality.

For primary interest to the company's local "partners in progress" is the quarterly statement of earnings which reflects a most satisfactory increase in revenue over the preceding 12 months period. Another item which shows the company's continued development concerns the building of a new high tension power line to provide improved service to customers of the Mountain State Power Company and Copco. Details of this large new project are quoted from the letter as follows:

"Plans are under way for the construction of a transmission line from Dixonville to Marshfield, Oregon for the purpose of a more extensive interchange of power between the Copco system and the system of the Mountain States Power company which is also one of the subsidiary public utility companies of Standard Gas and Electric company. Marshfield is the headquarters of the Coos Bay Division of the Mountain States Power company. Construction of this line will improve service in the respective territories by supplying a dual source of power through an inter-connected transmission network. Detailed plans are now in the course of completion and active construction will begin in the near future. It is expected that the line will be ready for service by fall."

In closing, the letter states that information concerning other construction items and full details of the company's major activities for the past year will be furnished shareholders in the 1928 Annual Report which will be distributed next month.

S. P. BIRTHDAY TO BE MARKED

The Southern Pacific is going to wish itself many happy returns of its 60th birthday, May 10, and is inviting the entire Pacific slope to join in the celebration.

In addition to putting on the counter a travel bargain—a round trip between any two points on Pacific lines for 60 per cent of the one-way fare—there is going to be a birthday party that night.

Because its family is so big—nearly 60,000 in the west and southwest—the birthday will be up in the air, broadcast by radio from station KPO, San Francisco, over the Pacific coast network of the Pacific Broadcasting company, and Salt Lake, Utah. Reinald Warrenrath, famous baritone, will help make the party a success, coming all the way from New York City just to do so.

On May 10, 1869, at Promontory, Utah, the Central Pacific—first union of the Southern Pacific, building east from Sacramento, met the Union Pacific, building west from Omaha. With a silver hammer Governor Leonard Stanford, one of the builders of the Central Pacific, drove a golden spike into a laurel tie—and all the country made made "whoopee" over the completion of the first transcontinental railroad.

At the radio celebration May 10, from 9:30 to 10:30 p. m. Pacific standard time, the story of the conquest of the Sierra and of the desert, one of the epics of pioneer accomplishments, will be told.

The "theme music," as they say in the movies, will be the songs and tunes of the 60's, with Reinald Warrenrath as the principal singer.

A prize of \$100 will be given to the boy or girl 18 years old or younger who sends in to KPO or to the Southern Pacific company, San Francisco, the best account of the story told over the radio.

Warrenrath's contribution to the program will include Invictus Hahn; The Railroad Cars Are Coming; Rider; The Hogeye Man; The Builder; Cadman; Ben Bolt; Kness; Seabanger; Cator; and the solo part in the Battle Hymn of the Republic.

DUCK DISEASE TO BE PROBED

Another attempt to solve the duck disease question of Tule lake—better organized and better financed than previous attempts—will be made by federal authorities this fall, it was revealed today by Ray Steel, Portland, federal game protector for Oregon.

"A noted authority on bird diseases, who is employed by the zoological department of the United States bureau of animal industry, will arrive in Klamath the latter part of this summer to take charge of the work," Mr. Steel said. "This person will cooperate with the state authorities and everything possible will be done to solve the problem and determine some definite plan of relief."

"I am afraid that this year will be a bad one for the game birds for the reason that there will be less water on Tule lake than on previous years; it seems on dry years that the disease hits hardest."

WOMAN BOUND OVER TO JURY

Because evidence submitted by arresting officers was held to be insufficient, seven charges of violating the federal prohibition law against Frank Baker of Chiloquin were dismissed today at a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas. Burt Baker's sister, Meda Baker Arrasmith, was bound over to the grand jury on the same seven charges and Eldon Smith, taken in the same Chiloquin raid, waived his preliminary examination and was also held to the Portland inquisitorial body.

Bond for \$750 for each defendant was set by the federal magistrate.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1, (UP)—Cigars made of cabbage leaves were sold here by Carlo Pia and he was sentenced in federal court today to serve three months in jail for the deception.

The complaining witness claimed he purchased a cigar from Pia for twenty-five cents to discover that cabbage leaves had been soaked in nicotine and wrapped in tin foil with second hand revenue stamps to resemble a "good smoke."

When he objected to Pia after trying to smoke the mixture he contended the answer was "what do you want for two-bits, some gold foil?"

**ICE CREAM EXALTS
THE LOWLY PRUNE**

DAVIS, Calif., May 1.—If you're tired of looking at prunes in the raw, stewed, or otherwise, a brand new way of fixing them, putting them in ice cream, may impress your palate favorably.

The University of California's agricultural department has perfected this type of ice cream, said to be very healthful because of the combination of the known food values of milk and prunes.

Several factories on the coast are manufacturing prune pulp, which is the condition the prunes are put into the ice cream. It is at present being produced commercially in several cities in California.

STOCK PRICES OF COPCO RISE

Sales of Six Per Cent Issue Progress Very Satisfactorily

At a recent meeting of representatives of the Investment Department of the California Oregon Power company at Medford, Oregon it was announced that sales of the company's 6 per cent preferred stock to its customers and friends in Northern California and Southern Oregon had progressed very satisfactorily during the past year. The issue of 15,000 shares approved by the Railroad Commission of California in March 1927 is practically sold out, only a few shares remaining to be sold.

Since February 1, 1928 the stock has advanced in price from \$98 per share to its present sell-

ing price of \$101 per share. The company is limiting sales in an effort to give everyone in the territory which it serves an opportunity to invest and thereby profit in the earnings of the company.

It was also announced that the Copco annual report for 1928, which will be released to stockholders this month, will contain many items of interest.

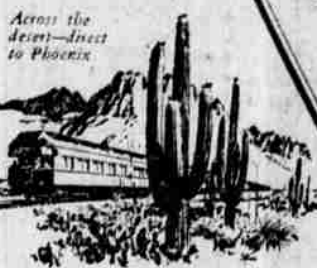
