FORBES SHOWS HITTING POWER AGAINST DARR

Hollywood Flash Comes Within "Ace" of Knocking Out Heavyweight

Just how hard this boy Frankie Forbes can hit when he's in earnest was demonstrated when he all but dropped Orville Darr, Spokane heavyweight, in the first round of a stiff workout in the Legion gymnasium last evening. Forbes meets "Tiger" Cline in the main event of a Legion card tomorrow night.

Darr has fought several main events here and is regarded as one of the toughest boys in the Klamath basin. But when Frankie, 35 pounds lighter, lashed over a straight right to the ribs, the heavyweight started to fold up, only to recover himself in time to carry on through the round. Add to this feat the fact that the boys were using young pillow cushions on their heads and the answer to the question is one sweet punch.

Forbes is in great shape. "I tip the beam at 150 pounds, but might drop down to 145 by the time the bell sounds," Forbes remarked. "Today I'm just loosening up a bit and tomorrow I'll just lay around and rest until the bell sounds. Never felt better in my life and predict I'll take this boy Cline, possibly over the knee route."

Forbes has created a great impression with the fans and betting seems to favor him just a little.

"Tiger" Cline appeared to be confident he could take his younger opponent to the cleaners.

"He's fast and has a punch, but I think he'll swallow more blows tomorrow night than he has seen in many a day," the middleweight remarked.

Considerable interest is being aroused in the bout between Billy Breedlove and Leo Lomelli. Lomelli who is half Italian and half Mexican, is a colorful little fighter, weighting in about 125 pounds.

"I got beaten the other night by Eddie Thomas," he admitted with a smile. "But at last, the fight stole the show in Portland. That's the way it goes. The first time I fought Thomas I beat him; the second time he takes me and perhaps when we meet a third time, I'll win again—at least I hope so. It was a great fight and I was outpointed alright."

Portland papers gave wide comment to the Lomelli-Thomas mix. It was a semi-windup and got a bigger hand than the main event.

Billy Church is in town with father, who also acts as manager. Church has been seen in action here before when he administered an unmerciful beating to Jack Breedlove. He fights the fast and clever Johnny McCoy in a six round semi-windup.

The preliminaries will be announced tomorrow.

It looks like a great card with the special, semi-windup and main event, all of main event calibre.

Preliminaries will start at 8:45 p. m. First there will be some tiny-mites, then two four, three minute rounds, and it will be 9:15 or longer before the special event comes off. The main event will probably get under way about 10 p. m. or a few minutes later.

Many a good boxer has developed a "brittle" jaw otherwise known as "fighter's sleeping sickness" from one blow in one particular fight.

Sid Terris was formerly a rugged strong fighter until recently and now almost any fighter can K. O. him. Fred Fulton developed a brittle jaw in his match with Jack Dempsey and never recovered.

Paul Herlichbach and Mike McTigue went the same way. Many a good hitter is ruined in baseball after he is "beaten" a few times. Frank Chance was one notable exception. He was hit thirty-seven times on the head and still remained a good hitter. But the "bean" ball developed a certain fascination for him that he couldn't overcome. He became powerless to dodge a ball thrown at his head and the constant punishment caused him to become almost deaf.

STECHER LOSES TO 'STRANGLER'

Former Champions Wrestle Before Large Crowd in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, May 2. (AP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, of the dazzling headlock, was one up on Joe Stecher, powerfully limbed exponent of the body scissors today in the count of matches won since their rivalry started back in 1916.

These two former heavyweight wrestling champions locked horns for the sixth time here last night, and Lewis won by taking two out of three falls in the finish match. It was his third triumph over Stecher. He previously had lost twice to Stecher and one of their six bouts was a draw.

In this, the sixth and shortest but most sizzling of all their encounters, Stecher won the first fall in twenty minutes and 51 seconds with his punishing body scissors, only to see victory grabbed away by Lewis' chunky and powerful arms. Lewis evened up matters in 14 minutes and two seconds with a body slam, and clamped a series of his stunning headlocks on Stecher after four minutes and 18 seconds for the winning fall.

Lewis and Stecher, each holder of the heavyweight championship three times since 1916, wrestled under terms which called for the winner take all—the purses of both totaling \$10,000 and Stecher's diamond-studded belt, once emblematic of the heavyweight title, and the possible right to a
