WARN AUTOISTS OF FAKE CLUBS

Klamath automobile owners are warned in a letter received by Assistant District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters to beware of "fake" automobile clubs.

The letter is from Robert M. Mount, manager of the Portland Business Bureau, and tells of the "United States Automobile Service club" and the "Pacific National Automobile association," which are operating in the Portland territory.

They charge membership fees of from \$2.50 to \$27 and give no service, the letter states. Most of the money collected goes to the salesmen and to the promoters of the schemes, according to Mr. Mount.

Station-Train Phone Service Said Possible

TORONTO, May 6. (AP)—The feasibility of two-way telephone conversation between a moving train and a stationary point has been demonstrated on the Canadian National railway. Service is to be made available shortly for passengers on trains between Chicago and Toronto.

A two-hour conversation was maintained between a train speeding northward through Ontario at 40 miles an hour and the main offices of the road at Toronto yesterday.

The telegraph wires along the railroad right-of-way are used by the system which has been developed under the direction of J. C. Burkholder of the Bell Telephone laboratories at Newark, N. J.

Radio waves carry the voice of the speaker in the railway car to the wires by which the impulses are transmitted to the receiving point.

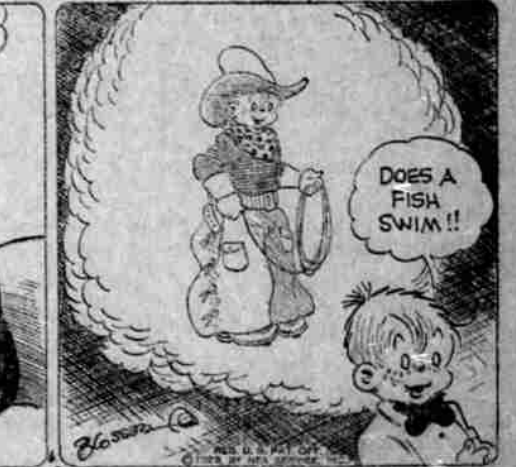
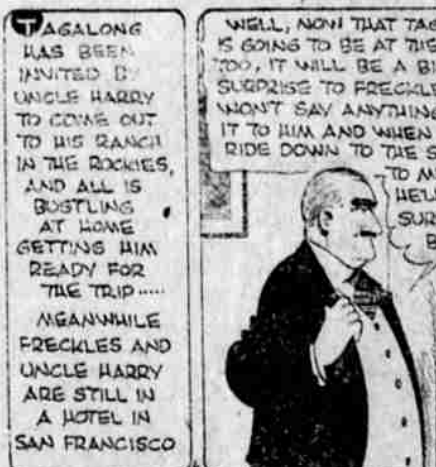
