 Harry J. Ruckelshaus, head coach of the Rutgers University football team, told me a good one about a "he-man" player.  
 Back in 1914 and 1915, when I was playing end for Rutgers varsity," said Harry, "our captain was John Peter Toohey, a 200-pound tackle who later received all-American mention. There were no parlor-chair athletes on the field in those days, and unless a man got a leg broken or was killed, he was patched up by the trainer and sent back to the game.  
 "In one of our out-of-town contests, against Hamilton College, Toohey went into the game with a slab of raw beef-steak on his shoulder, which had been injured in practice. As the play started, he started to perspire, the steak slipped down Toohey's arm, cramping his style, as it were. "So Big John," forgetting the pain of his injury entirely in the excitement of the game, reached up his sleeve, pulled a couple of pounds of raw beef steak from beneath his jersey and tossed it aside.  
 "I shall never forget the horrified expression on the face of his opponent, who thought the steak was Toohey's own flesh, and that 'Big John' was a super-man, ripping out muscles and tendons manfully continuing in the game."

The matches were held on the police range.

Miss Winnard made 225 points out of a possible 250, with a single shot, 22 (20) target pistol at 20 yards by flashlight.

The women's record for this distance has been held for the past five years by a woman of Columbus, Ohio who made a score of 225.

Miss Winnard is a member of the Oregon Women's Revolver club and the Portland Revolver club. A year ago, she had never fired a pistol, but since that time has been practicing diligently under the tutelage of Police Sergeant Young of Portland. She is the sister of Mrs. Fred Fleet of this city.

 Boyes, chairman of the Western Trunk Lines committee, said the reductions should only be construed "as indicative of the attitude of the carriers to assist the president of the U. S. in his program for relieving an emergency to the extent that these abnormal reductions in rates may help the situation."

The rates from the Missouri river to Chicago and from St. Paul and Minneapolis to Chicago, represent a reduction of six cents per 100 pounds from the Missouri river to the gulf, it is a reduction of 11½ cents per 100 pounds and from St. Louis to New Orleans a reduction of 5¢.

## FIND NO CLUES ABOUT MURDER

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 7. (AP)—Without a single tangible clue upon which to work, deputy sheriffs today continued their investigation of the fatal shooting of George M. Hess, federal building janitor. Hess was shot to death at 1 a. m. last Saturday by an unidentified assailant who awakened him and his wife and then shot through a window, killing the man.  
 The revolver with which the crime was committed was found later in a nearby orchard. Tracks from the orchard to the Hess house were discovered but have contributed in no way to the solution of the murder.  
 The only information Mrs. Hess can give is that a man whose upper face was hidden by a black mask stood at the window and commanded that a light be turned on. She believes the man had a stabbie of grey beard. Hess was shot and killed as he and his wife ran from the room. Hess had no enemies. Police do not believe robbery was a motive as a billfold was within easy reach of the window at which the killer was standing.
