Petition Asks That Building Tax Dropped

A petition, asking the county court to strike the 1929 taxes on the federal building site property from the assessment rolls will be filed by the Klamath county chamber of commerce as the result of a discussion on the question held today at the directors luncheon.

E. H. Balsiger, member of the Federal building committee reported on the delinquent taxes for 1928, stating the O. C. & E. railroad had agreed to pay half the taxes, \$182.50 should the city see fit to raise the remaining \$182.50.

"In fact, N. H. Hogue stated the railroad would agree to pay the taxes, amounting to \$365 providing the city would assure the company of the reimbursement of one-half the taxes," Mr. Balsiger stated.

The business men of the city will be asked to raise the money by a committee from the chamber of commerce. Already \$50 of the \$182.50 has been raised.

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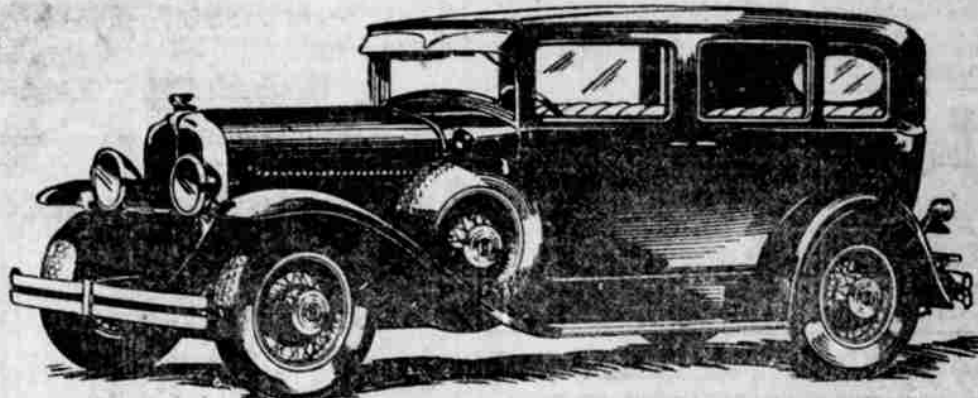
