Not A Sword But Peace

LAST year's gain in church membership for the country, 1,115,000, not counting Catholic minors who are listed by the Catholics as members when born, brings the total to just about 50,000,000. The figures are compiled by the Christian Herald.

The old enumeration of the hymn, "Ten Thousand Times Ten Thousand," is thus completed in America alone. The host of Christian soldiers marches onward, indeed!

But not, as we earnestly desire to believe, "as to war." The days of the Church Militant, let us hope—at least in the old sense of aggression by force of arms against the infidel—is become but a picturesque tradition as we look back upon such episodes as the Fourth Crusade when the Greek church at Constantinople was raided, despoiled and desecrated, though nonheretical, in the fiery ardors of those marching behind the banners of the cross against the Saracens at Jerusalem.

No longer is salvation restricted to those who bear our own particular denominational label, whether gentile or Jew. With St. Paul, who followed his Master in nothing more than this, we go out to win by the truth rather than by the sword, pressing on as witnesses rather than conquerors, bringing pity, let us trust, and understanding with the promise of redemption.

A Skyscraper's Age

THINGS grow old quickly in this modern world. In Chicago, a matter of 35 years ago, was built the world's first skyscraper—the Tacoma Building, 14 stories tall, erected on a new principle which made a steel framework carry all the weight.

For years it was a marvel. Architects studied it, and the lessons it taught led to the construction of the towering buildings that mark every American city.

But now it is being torn down—after a scant 35 years of life. It is out of date—too small, too cramped. In its place will rise a building three times as high.

OLD-TIME LOGGING

Total Eclipse May Bring New Advance of Science; Parties Wait for Phenomenon of Sky

BANGKOK, Siam, May 8, (UP)—Important scientific advances may develop Thursday—weather and circumstances concerning—when the moon is scheduled to trail its shadow across the eastern hemisphere.

Five scientific expeditions were prepared last night to view the five-minute total eclipse of the sun from strategic points in the narrow area on the earth's surface which will be in total darkness.

American expeditions in Sumatra and the Philippines, German groups in Sumatra, Siam and the Philippines and the Central British expedition at Pattani, Siam, and awaiting the period of totality to further man's knowledge in various fields.

Practically all groups of the several expeditions will bend special effort to verification of the Einstein theory of deflection of light—visible only in a period of complete eclipse. A test star has been studied and photographed for comparison with photographs and observations to be made during the eclipse which will determine just how much a ray of starlight is bent by proximity to the sun—an important factor in calculations based on the Einstein theory.

The flaming tongues of the Corona, the brilliant halo about the moon during eclipse, will be carefully observed to determine just how the sun convulses its fiery, there may be a clue to the successive glacial and tropical periods through which the earth has passed and perhaps science will gain another notch in the advance of long distance weather forecasting.

REFUELING OF EARTH WILL BE REALITY SOON

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 8, (UP)—Refueling the earth with natural gas after the supply in a community has been exhausted soon will be an accomplished fact, Samuel W. Meals, Pittsburgh Gas Company head, told delegates to the American Gas Association convention here today.

Experiments have been conducted demonstrating the practicability of storing natural gas in abandoned wells during the summer months, to care for peak consumption in the winter, he said.

VALIANT BAND BEATEN OFF BY FEDERAL ARMY

MEXICO CITY, May 8, (AP)—Dispatches today from Guadalupe told how a band of 1,500 "cristos" fought their way through the town of Colatlan, Jalisco, to the church of San Nicolas, which they tried in vain to hold against federal troops of General Saturnino Cedillo.

The insurgents were driven from the church having 68 dead and 48 wounded. 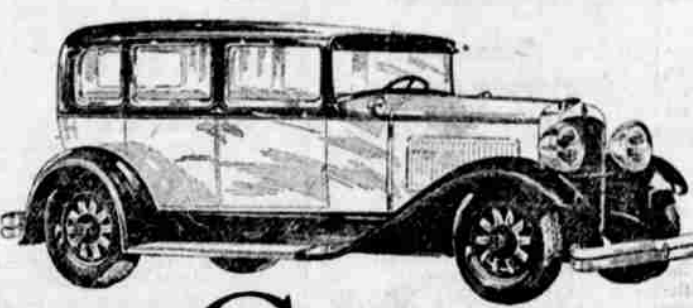
