

CONSTRUCTION ON S. P. SPAN IS UNDER WAY

Project Will Cost \$12,000,000 When Finished

Signifying another step forward in establishing a double track transcontinental line between San Francisco and points east and north, The Southern Pacific has under construction a bridge across Suisan Bay near Martinez, California, according to S. R. Berry, local agent.

The project, when completed will cost in the neighborhood of \$12,000,000 and will reduce running time and operating cost of freight on the Overland and Shasta Routes. This will also provide a more direct and more economical route for a large part of the freight traffic originating and consigned to points on the railroad south of San Francisco.

The bridge will be a double track structure, principally of billion steel, and its load carrying capacity will be equal to that of any other railway bridge in the country. From abutment to abutment it will be 5,603 feet long. It will consist mainly of seven 526 foot through truss spans, one lift span 323 feet long and two deck truss spans of approximately 264 and 504 feet in length. Short steel viaduct approaches will be stationed at both north and south entrances.

Unanimous public support for the company's application to the war department for the construction of the bridge was given at an open hearing held by the district army engineer at San Francisco. Sixteen commercial and transportation organizations representing the communities affected by the construction of the bridge, submitted resolutions in support of the application.

"It will take in the neighborhood of two years to complete the project," Mr. Berry concluded.

the payment of import duties. The Debenture section would give the proposed farm board the option of invoking the plan. It would not compel the board to use it.

A graduated reduction of Debenture rates would be provided for use whenever over production might be forecast in debenture products.

Complicates Legislation

Inclusion of the Debenture section complicates the enactment of agricultural legislation in view of the strong opposition to the proposal by both President Hoover and the house. That branch of congress previously decided overwhelmingly against it.

After the farm bill is passed, the Debenture section will be dismissed by a conference of senate and house committees where administration leaders are convinced it will be eliminated.

What the senate's attitude then will be is a matter of some concern to those desiring early enactment of a farm measure.

Thirteen republicans voted against the administration motion to eliminate the Debenture provision.

Only two democrats voted with the republican administration group.

GANG WAR IS AGAIN STARTED

staff and their supposed executions today were seen as the stroke of avengers for the seven followers of "Bugs" Moran, the north side chief, who were lined up against the wall on a North Clark street garage nearly three months ago and swept with machine gun fire.

Thrice have Scallisi and Anselmi been tried together for the slayings of two policemen, only to win acquittals because they professed to believe the detective squad that chased them was a squad of their underworld foes.

Two Were Indicted

Scallisi and Jack McGurn, "Machine Gun" Jack, were the only two indicted for the Moran gang massacre. Their trials were deferred several times at the behest of state's attorneys and police who wanted further time to build up cases against them.

Last week attorneys obtained their release from the county jail under heavy bond on the promise of their appearance when the trial was called. McGurn had been trapped in a downtown hotel where he had been hiding since the day of the seven fold murder. Scallisi, however, snatched into police headquarters one day and surrendered, observing he had been one of the dozen listed as "wanted" by the police for investigation.

Pair Found Dead

The pair were found heaped in the back seat of a coupe that had been nosed into a ditch near Wolfe Lake, just this side of the Illinois state line, their bodies covered by a blanket. Twenty feet away officers found a third body, identified tentatively as that of Joe Guinta, another gangland habitue.

Guinta, who was thought to be the third victim, was a west side tobacco store owner and also had been questioned in connection with the Moran gang killings. In a pocket of the man's coat police found a card bearing the name of Joe Berardi, official of a cigar shop. The reporters, however, believed this was not the dead man's name. All other marks of identification had been removed from the bodies.

Taken For "Ride"

The men, police said, were probably taken for the familiar gangland "ride", shot to death with pistols or machine guns and the car ditched on the lonely prairie road. The cushion had been removed from the back seat and the bodies dumped in its place.

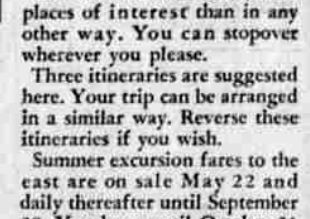
