

THREE PLACES LAY CLAIM TO HOME OF ADAM

Ancient Traditions Clash Over Location of Biblical Eden

BAGDAD, Iraq, May 10 (AP)—Seekers for the site of the biblical garden of Eden are recommended to direct their quest to Iraq, where in the Valley of the Euphrates they may have choice of three places which have claims to be the genuine and original paradise.

If one were to ask the man in the street either in Baghdad or Basra for information as to the first home of Adam and Eve, he would undoubtedly be directed to Kurna, at the confluence of the Euphrates and the Tigris rivers, as the exact spot. Such indeed is the ancient tradition of the country.

Another place, however, is believed by Sir William Wilson, who spent a number of years in Iraq on irrigation works, as the fair land inhabited by the first parents. This spot lies between the Euphrates and the Tigris, near Ur of the Chaldeans, the birthplace of Abraham.

Supporting his belief, Sir William quotes Genesis, Chapter 2, Verse 10: "A river went out of Eden to water the garden, and from thence it was parted, and became into four heads;" and Verses 5 and 6 of the same chapter: "The Lord God had not caused it to rain upon the earth. But there went up a mist from the earth and watered the whole face of the ground."

Sir William advances the opinion that the word "mist" is an inexact translation and that the proper rendering would speak of natural irrigation as opposed to artificial watering. This spot near Ur is said to be a land formation where a river was "parted" and became into four heads.

UNUSUAL PLEA SUCCESSFUL IN MURDER TRIAL

Mother and Daughter are Consigned to Insane Asylums

CHICAGO, May 10. (AP)—An unusual form of insanity, refused admission as a defense in the Snyder-Gray murder trial in New York, saved a woman and her daughter from possible capital punishment yesterday in what officials believe to be the first case where it has been accepted by a law court in the United States.

"Folie a deux" (literally "folly of two") was the defense offered in behalf of Mrs. Clara Fischer, 57, and her daughter, Ethel, 31, who strangled their husband and father, Jacob, with his necktie while he was dressing April 19.

Dr. Francis J. Gory, superintendent of the psychopathic hospital, explained that the insanity was, roughly, a "joint insanity." The mother had been afflicted all her life, he stated, and the daughter had developed it within recent years, until both had an identical complex. In their case, according to their testimony and that of Dr. Gory, it caused them to believe the father was the head of a cult called the "Devil's Forebear," and had cursed them.

The jury returned a verdict of "murder while insane." Judge J. Sullivan committed the mother to the state insane hospital at Elgin and the daughter to the asylum at Kankakee.

Air Terminal of Future Provides Every Comfort for Travelers

SEATTLE, Wash., May 10.—The old, disheveled, wind-swept remnant of air travel is doomed to be replaced by comfort.

For the first time in the United States, and probably in the world an airport passenger depot is to be built on the principle of a railroad terminal. This is the Boeing Airport now under construction by King county authorities at Seattle, Wash.

Passenger traffic will pass from the ticket office through the passenger concourse directly into the cabins of the planes without once leaving cover, just as in a modern railroad station. No more stopping about a muddy landing field, dodging whirling propellers.

The Boeing Airport, to cost ultimately \$1,500,000, exclusive of the 160-acre site, will be the first materialization of the "airport of the future" as conceived by the airport engineers of the Austin Company of Cleveland, Ohio, engineers and builders. The eyes of the entire aviation industry are focused upon the port and some authorities predict that it will revolutionize airport construction.

Even the Croydon Field in England, the Tempelhof Field in Berlin and the Littorio Airport at Rome are said not to be comparable in design to the port being built for the west-coast city.

Although a purely public enterprise, it is named in honor of William E. Boeing of the Boeing Airplane company, one of Seattle's leading citizens.

Covered Concourse

The passenger station will consist of three building units built above the covered concourse.

There are landing areas for the planes—one 160 by 75 feet, the other 160 by 125 feet, both with 25-foot clearance. The construction provides for indefinite expansion.

When the passenger alights from his taxi at the station, he enters the general waiting room, purchases his ticket and goes to the passenger concourse on the mezzanine level. There he may watch the arriving and departing planes through windows while awaiting his own.

When his plane is called, he descends one of the stairways and walks through a railed-in passageway and the open cabin door of the plane directly to his seat.

Dangers Eliminated

As planes taxi to and fro between the landing area and their hangars there is no danger, as in the present type of airport, of hitting a careless visitor straggling along the taxiing runways. No one can gain access to the field except through business there. The station is to be provided with all the conveniences for travelers to be found in a railroad station. In addition to the general waiting room on the mezzanine floor of the main building will be a restaurant, concessions, air mail and express departments, and rest rooms. It will also house offices for United States customs and immigration, inspection, Boeing Airport will be an official port of entry.

The upper part of the main waiting room will be on the mezzanine.

On the first floor of the intermediate pier will be department of commerce and field offices, on the mezzanine, the pilot's dormitory, radio room and work room.

The lights control room will be on the first floor of the upper pier, and the airport manager's office on the mezzanine. The observatory will be located above, on the second floor of a tower.

The entire construction will be of brick and steel, including the hangars detached from the depot, and will comprise 65,500 square feet of floor space. Building is being rushed in order that the "airport of the future" may be in full operation before the end of the year.
