

CONGRESSMAN NOT GUILTY OF LIQUOR COUNT

Representative McHaelson Found Innocent by Federal Jury

KEY WEST, Fla., May 10. (A. P.)—Representative M. Alfred Michaelson of Illinois was free today of charges that he brought liquor into this country from Cuba but his brother-in-law, who admitted ownership of the trunks containing the contraband, faced trial on the same charges.

Michaelson was acquitted early this morning by a federal jury on two counts of an indictment charging importation of liquor and its transportation from Key West to Jacksonville.

W. O. Hughes, acting federal district attorney, announced shortly after Michaelson's acquittal, that he will bring the same charges against Walter Gramma, a Chicago coal dealer and Michaelson's brother-in-law, who from the witness stand yesterday claimed the trunks which leaked liquor in a station in Jacksonville and brought the indictment of Michaelson.

Trunks Not Opened.

The trunks came through the customs at Key West without inspection through "courtesy of the port," granted the congressman.

Prosecution attorneys repeatedly have termed Gramma "the fall guy" in the case, and while he himself stood on his constitutional rights in the trial regarding the possession of the liquor alleged to have been contained in the trunks, government attorneys declare that since he has assumed the responsibility he will be prosecuted accordingly.

Congressman Happy.

When told of the verdict in his case early today, Congressman Michaelson expressed great happiness, declaring that "the verdict bore out my original statement."

"The ordinary man ought to know that the government officers have done their duty," was the only comment offered on the verdict by Assistant Attorney General J. N. Morrison.

Gramma's arrest will be sought before he leaves the state, Hughes said, in commenting upon the newest development in the case. He will be charged with smuggling and violating the prohibition act.

GIVE GIRLS OF NATION CHANCE SAYS SPEAKER

NEW YORK, May 10. (UP)—Women are ready to take over the navy's deck scrubbing so they can join men sailors in seeing the world, Miss Edna Foley announced today in appealing for "a break for the girls."

Miss Foley's announcement, appeal was inspired, she said, by looking at the thousands of "sun-bronzed girls" now here with the Atlantic fleet.

"What about the millions of factory and office girls?" Miss Foley asked in a letter to the Evening Telegram. "Why doesn't Uncle Sam pay more attention to his girlhood? I'm not asking for a pleasure cruise. Girls can scrub decks and peel potatoes. Give them a glimpse of life. A year or two at sea will render them much more fit for the task of rearing stalwart sons to swell the navy ranks."

"If Uncle Sam awakes to his responsibility he may put my name down as applicant No. 1."

BANDIT CHIEF DEFENDS POWER

Ford Says Crime Caused by Wrong Mixtures in Stomach

NEW YORK, May 10. (UP)—Henry Ford has laid at the Kitchen door the responsibility for most crime and unsocial activity and appealed to the church to make dietetics an important part of religion.

In an interview with Norman Beasley, publisher, today in Red Book magazine, Ford discusses the relation between crime and food.

Blames Mixtures

"Most wrong acts," Ford is quoted as saying, "committed by men are the result of wrong mixtures in the stomach. Boozing is no food, but people put it in their stomachs and you know what frequently happens. Crime, if that is what you want to call it, comes from wrong mixtures."

"For a long time now the clergy have been teaching people to be good. They cannot do this and disregard habits of living, health is a condition that affects everything. Instead of cluttering up religion with a lot of things that do not belong to it, why don't the clergy teach people how to eat? There are such great changes of mental attitude to be obtained by correct habits of diet, that it would better pay the clergy to attend to the commoner and more respectable habits. Such as eating, than to some of the bad results of bad eating."

Ministers "Can Learn"

"Granting that," Beasley asked Ford, "how can ministers be expected to give intelligent discussion on food values? How can they know?"

"They can learn," Ford is quoted as replying, "they can first find out for themselves by experiment. Religion has always had a lot to say about eating—you have only to look into the Bible to see that. Ministers can learn, or if they don't want to learn, they can invite people who do understand into their pulpits."

Ford emphasized that dietetics would be no substitute for religion but only a part of it.

"You cannot have a thoroughgoing, complete religion without it," He added. "You have a system of ideas, but not a complete system of life, and, after all, the life is the religion."

FOUR MEMBERS CONGREGATION SLAY MINISTER

Pastor Beaten to Death By Men Who Disliked Portion of Sermon

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10. (A. P.)—A beating alleged to have been administered by four members of his congregation because they objected to a portion of his sermon was given as the cause of injuries which resulted in the death in a hospital here Thursday of the Rev. Andrew Lajunen, pastor of the Finnish Pentecostal church of Mullan, Idaho. The minister lay unconscious for two days after entering a Portland hospital but managed to rally yesterday and tell his version of the affair to Portland police. He declared he had left Mullan three days after the beating and had gone to Spokane, later coming here to visit a friend.

Lajunen said he had refused to sign a complaint against the four men, whom he was unable to name. He declared that the sheriff at Mullan had dropped an investigation of the case when he (Lajunen) had refused to sign a complaint.

Hospital attendants said a skull fracture had caused death.

Hartley Demands Fund Accounting

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 10. (U. Girl, 22, Pleads Case of Textile Workers Before Senate Group, Tells of Pittance for Labor

WASHINGTON, May 10. (U. P.)—A slight, mild-mannered 22-year-old girl pleaded with obvious effect here Thursday the cause of the striking southern textile workers.

The Joan of Arc of the workers was Miss Margaret Bowen, who until the strike was declared, worked for \$10.50 a week in one of the mills at Elizabethton, Tenn.

Before Senate Group

She told her story of the spontaneous uprising the girls employed in the mills both to the senate manufacturers committee, holding hearing on the Wheeler resolution to investigate industrial conditions in the south, and the National Trade Union League of America, at its annual convention.

Miss Bowen said she went to work in the Elizabethton mills last year because she was promised a weekly wage of \$16, but her first pay check was for \$10.98.

"I thought at first that was just for the period of training," she declared, "but it didn't get any bigger for a long time and after asking for a raise several times they finally boosted me one cent an hour, which made my check \$10.68."

"I worked 56 hours a week, from 7:00 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. every day.

"It cost me \$5 a week for my room, \$1 for bus fare and \$1 for laundry. Besides that, \$1.30 was deducted from my wages every month for insurance.

"There wasn't much left for clothes but they expected us to be fresh and neat all the time. If we weren't the foremen let us know about it."

"I lived in a room with three other girls."

To "Stick It Out"

The girl said she knew nothing about organized labor before the strike but that she and

more than 4,000 other workers have joined the union since and intend "to stick it out until we get our rights."

Among the strikers, she said, are many girls only 19 to 15 years old. In their behalf particularly she appealed to the convention for food and supplies to be distributed among the strikers.

Explaining the low wages, Miss Bowen said:

"The companies could pay more and wouldn't but the chamber of commerce said they could get labor in Elizabethton at from \$5 to \$10 a week."

What action will be taken he did not say, but intimated a conference of agricultural and horticultural experts might be called to consider the situation if it became at all threatening.

—The dairy plant of Josef Wagner in Cicero has been protected for nearly a month against violence by an injunction, but a bomb nearly wrecked the place early today. Wagner recently refused to join a milk dealers association and they threatened him, he said.

LET CONTRACT ON SCHOOL JOB

Charles D. Withers, Klamath Falls contractor, was yesterday awarded the contract to construct four additional school rooms and an auditorium, of stucco construction, at the Altamont school at a cost of \$17,861.

Six bids were submitted to the county school board and Withers was low bidder. Other bidders and bids submitted are: Sig Ash, \$19,600; Hoover & McNeil, \$19,650; Reinero & Harper, \$19,243; Fred Jordan, \$21,511; and L. K. Porter, \$22,339.57.

The board issued a call for bids for the construction of a two-room addition to the Merrill school, two-room addition to the Chilcoquin school; three-room addition to the Malin school, and a new three-room school at Fort Klamath. Bids on these projects are to be opened on May 21 at a special meeting of the board.

QUINCY, Ill., May 10.—Like a triumphant warrior, Frank Jasper, Quincy's new democratic mayor, strode into his office, picked up the official broom to make a clean sweep of the police and fire departments only to find that some "bones the victor does not gather all the spoils."

Jasper turned a doubtful ear to those who urged him on. The doubt in his mind was caused by an irate and unsympathetic city council and a set of stubborn officials who refuse to withdraw although the mayor had announced the dismissal of some 35 policemen, eight detectives, and 26 firemen, including the chiefs of the two departments.

The city council refused to approve his actions; today when some 80 new appointees reported for duty they were turned away by the former heads of the departments.
