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the other hand, he pointed out, it would be at least 77 miles longer between all principal points of production and consumption.

Nor would the Western Pacific-Great Northern line offer any wider market, according to the Southern Pacific attorney, who explained he was writing them to let them know "that the line is not available to California shippers, and markets of California available to points in the Northwest, just the same as they will be if the Great Northern-Western Pacific extension is constructed."

"No lower rates are offered, but in place merely an increase in transportation costs is threatened," he added. He cited interpretations of the Transportation Act of 1920 by both the Interstate Commerce commission and U. S. Supreme court to show that the existing law is designed to prevent interstate carriers from constructing superfluous lines which might increase the burden of waste upon the public.

"It is clear," he continued, "that under the theory of existing law construction of new railroads which must depend for support largely upon the traffic that can be diverted from existing lines will necessarily add to the total bill the public must pay, as well as weaken the character of service rendered by such existing lines."

The speaker pointed out that rates between California and cities of the North are necessarily low, inasmuch as they are governed by low cost of water transportation. "In fact," he added, "there is no lower rate base anywhere in the United States than between California and the Northwest."

Mr. Day declared that not only does "the Pacific Ocean parallel to the rail line forever have a transportation monopoly along the Pacific coast, but that in addition we have competition on the highways reaching every village and city served by the railroad and as early as the beginning of competition by airplane."

As to the general competitive situation, he pointed out that in Oregon Southern Pacific is faced with the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Union Pacific, and Spokane Portland & Seattle railway as well as of the Oregon Electric, owned by the northern lines, extending about the full length of the Willamette Valley and in California Southern Pacific must compete with three transcontinental lines.

In connection with the talk of competition, Mr. Day stated it is amusing to note that for a long time the Great Northern organization has put forth great effort in the Pacific Northwest to arouse public interest against railroad competition that results from the highly competitive lines of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific. He pointed out that the proposed consolidation of those lines is now pending before the Interstate Commerce commission.

"They have represented that if the ruinous competition can be brought to an end, there will be a saving of millions annually in operating expenses and other charges to the lasting benefit of the trouble. These claims are in violent conflict with their present utterances."

Replying to charge of the Western Pacific that "in the Sacramento Valley rail competition ends at Chico and does not reappear until we reach Oregon," Mr. Day pointed out that the district mentioned has a splendid railroad with frequent passenger and freight train service, ample car supply and every modern transportation facility.

PAYING LIENS MUST BE PAID

A campaign to clean up paying liens before certain properties in the city will be foreclosed is being planned by city officials.

On May 26 foreclosure proceedings will be instituted but it is hoped by the city administration that most of the liens will have been paid up by that time.

"There is an erroneous impression," said Roy Fouch, who is handling the matter "that six per cent on these liens is cheaper than bank money. However, when these speculators hold out, refunding bond issues become necessary and that places an additional burden on the taxpayer."

Mr. Fouch said that there are approximately \$18,000 in delinquencies now and that the city administration had reached the point where it planned to undertake foreclosures.
