MISS COLLETT WINS AGAIN IN GOLF TOURNEY

Glenna Advances to Third Round in English Tournament

ANDREW, Scotland, May 14. (AP)—Glenna Collett, American champion, advanced to the third round of the British women's golf championship today by defeating Miss Maudie Bryant, of the Ashford Manor club, near London, 2 to 1.

Her triumph was Miss Collett's second in the championship. She defeated Marjorie White of Southampton, 5 and 3 in a first round encounter yesterday.

The American title-holder's victory was scored in weather conditions somewhat similar to those that were partially responsible for her elimination in an early round of the British championship of last year. She had to contend with a stiff southerly wind from the first tee to the last and a pelting rain, which started just as she rounded the turn made conditions even worse.

As was the case in her match with Miss White yesterday, Miss Collett failed out her match with Miss Bryant largely because of the decided superiority of her golf game. On the greens the English girl more than held her own.

Miss Collett was forced to come from behind to win. After having the first hole, the American champion went one down at the second and never took the lead until the eighth where she held out in three to the English player's four. Miss Collett rounded the turn one up and increased this lead over the second half of the run until she ended matters at the 16th.

The day "Cactus" Grayback clinched the only pennant the Philadelphia Nationals ever won, before or since, with a home run in Boston. I sat in a restaurant that night and listened to a newsboy shouting, "Phillies Win National League Pennant," and with a pencil figured out on the tablecloth what my world series out would be.

The day Jim Vaughn for the Cubs and Fred Toney for the Reds both pitched a "no hit, no run" game against each other, and Jim Thorne won the game for Cincinnati in the tenth inning with a swinging bunt that scored the only run of the game.

The day I won my first game pitching for the New York Giants, beating Boston 4-0 and brought out every edition of every newspaper that night from the newsstands.

The day I broke the Giants' winning streak of 17 straight games in 1916, while playing for Philadelphia, and pitched nothing but fast balls, and Walter Trumbull telling me afterwards that he knew I would stop them with my "round home" curve.

Walter Hagen Takes Lead in Golf Tourney

MOORETOWN, Eng., May 14. (AP)—Walter Hagen, British open champion, took the lead in the first qualifying round of the Yorkshire evening tournament when he turned in a sensational 69. The American pro went out in 35 strokes in spite of a hard wind and came home in 34.

Hagen, the third American to finish, wrested the lead from Archie Compston, giant British Golf pro, who had returned a count of 71.

Ed Dudley, with 73 and Horton Smith, 75, were the other Americans to complete their rounds before "The Haig". Leslie Cotton also scored 73 and Aubrey Doomer and Jose Jurado, the Argentine pro, were in a group credited with scores of 74.

(AP)—Paul Yeoman, 25, whose home in Stayton received serious burns and a fractured skull Monday morning when a gasoline tank on the heavy ledgerwood donkey engine on which he was working, blew up. The accident occurred at camp 26 of the Hammond Lumber company, a few miles from here. Details were meager, but it was said no one else was injured in the explosion.

Stecher Step Nearer Match For Big Title

TULSA, Okla., May 14. (AP)—Joe Stecher, Nebraska scissor artist and former holder of the world's heavyweight wrestling crown, took an appreciative stride forward in his comeback campaign here last night when he defeated Joe Malcevic, Utica, N. Y.

Stecher lost the first fall in 51 minutes of cautious grappling when, in his anxiety to bring Malcevic to the floor where he could apply the full force of his body scissors, he became careless of his shoulders and allowed them to rest upon the mat.

In the second fall which came in 12 minutes, Stecher crashed down upon Malcevic, his knee sinking in the Panther's side as they landed and his scissors brought a quick finish. When Malcevic returned for the last fall, he was obviously in pain and succumbed to another body scissors in one minute.

"Old Man Par" Severely Hit By Golf Fans

OFFICERS SAVE BOOZE RUNNERS

NEW YORK, May 14. (AP)—Customs enforcement officers are not a bad lot. Michael Dillon has learned.

Two of them jumped into the Hudson River to save Dillon's life when his boat overturned and later when they stretched him out on the dock, wet and chilled, they poured liquor down his throat.

The customs officers had been lying in wait for Dillon and two companions who were suspected of having liquor cargoes in their rowboats. John Duffy and Patrick Sheehan, who were in one boat, landed safely but were arrested. Dillon, who was a bit behind, saw the officers and tried to escape but his boat was caught in a backwash and upset.

Dillon caught on to a floating log and cried for help. Two of the officers, George Boehm and George Bruno, stripped off their outer clothing, plunged in and rescued him. The liquor given Dillon was taken from his companions. Dillon also was arrested.

SUSPEND BERLENBACH

PHILADELPHIA, May 14. (U. P.)—Paul Berlenbach, former light heavyweight boxing champion, now a heavyweight wrestler, was suspended indefinitely today by the Pennsylvania athletic commission after a hearing on charges that his match with Pay Machay last week was "no contest." 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SELECT SITE FOR AIRPORT

representative of the United States government could arrive in person and view the different offerings.

Study Conditions

This was deemed essential owing to the many demands that the government makes relative to a proper site. The closeness to hills, the air currents, the levelness of the ground, the possibility of securing water, the location not too close to growing settlements, the nature of the soil, and last but by no means least, proper drainage, all enter into the consideration of the site.

Added to this is the price, which the local committee had to give some attention, for it is recorded that in many cities where airport bonds have been voted that an expensive site cuts down the money for improvement to an extent that an awkward position follows.

It was this very thing that the committee has been pondering over. And when Rufus Moore put the price of his land for municipal airport purposes to \$30 an acre, it seemed the best possible bargain to obtain.

Mr. Moore would not sell the tract to an individual at that price, and to start with his price was higher. He listened to the request of the committee, however, and agreed to deliver the land at the price named.

Six Miles Examined

When Mr. Hoppin arrived yesterday the committee gave him their time and all visited the six pieces of land that had been listed. One was the Frank McCornick pasture on Klamath Lake another was the Deibel land six miles south on the Wood-Klamath highway, two others were lands belonging to the K. D. company near where the Gun Club has its shooting ground, another was the Ankon ranch, and

the last was the Rufus Moore 200-acre tract south of the county farm.

Mr. Hoppin objected to all the other sites but when he reached the Moore tract and examined it carefully he pronounced it an excellent air field. His reasons are: It is comparatively level. It is situated on far enough that new additions to the city will not encroach upon the field. It has soil sufficiently good to insure a grass turf. It is in such shape that a runway 4,000 feet long is obtainable. It is located away from the hills so that the heavier planes can take off without danger.

Many Questions Answered

Following the day's work of investigation the committee met with its chairman, Mr. Krause, and Mr. Hoppin at dinner last evening and heard something about air transportation and what may be expected in the near future.

Mr. Hoppin reviewed the common mistakes made by many cities, the chief one being too small a tract of land. He contended that 4,000 feet is necessary for a proper runway to meet the demand of the larger and heavier planes. He stated that 20-passenger ships will be coming into Klamath Falls without doubt as soon as the port is completed.

Business will at once begin as soon as there is a proper landing field, according to the government representative, and it is therefore imperative to have the right size field.

After hearing an hour's discussion of air fields and air transportation, the committee passed a resolution endorsing the Moore field and ordered it submitted to the city council as the committee's official findings.

It will be remembered that the committee was created for the purpose of selecting a suitable field at the least possible cost. With this act the committee's work is finished, for it has no official standing and can only recommend to the city administration.

There is a belief that the mayor and council desire the

committee to continue its work until the airport is completed, but nothing definite has been as yet determined along these lines.

One thing is now certain: Klamath Falls has the ground for an airport and she has sufficient money to erect a good one. The most useful thing is sufficient space for safe landing and safe take-offs. This is ascertained in the 300 acres and thus Klamath Falls will have one rating in the eyes of the government that will be of value. The next thing is to build the field according to the recommendations of the department of commerce.

Have Sufficient Funds

A request will be made for the department to outline in detail its wishes and this city will follow these stipulations. Whether the work will be done by local engineering or whether it will be given to engineers who follow nothing but airport construction is a matter for the council to decide for, after all, it is the city council that will finally pass on these matters and determine just how the money from the \$250,000 bond issue will be spent.

That the council will approve the recommendation to purchase the Rufus Moore land at \$9,000 or \$30 an acre there is not the least question. As to further procedure that remains for the council to determine.

McGitue held the lead all the way, giving his opponent a boxing lesson which left the Hollander with a badly cut face. Hoffman was down for the count of seven in the seventh round.
