the case of the heating and cooking rate large users will be charged for a certain number of kilowatt hours at 1c instead of 1 1/2c as formerly.

Judging from the number of customers affected and their average use at the present time, it is estimated that they will save, under the new rates, about \$13,200.00 a year.

These new rates have been approved by the Public Service Commission of Oregon and will become effective May 15, 1929.

CHICAGO, May 14—Another youthful belief, that the handling of toads causes warts, has been blasted by Karl P. Schmidt in a book recently published by the Field Museum of Natural History. "This belief," says Schmidt, "is wholly without foundation. It evidently has arisen from the simple analogy between the wartiness of toads and the existence of warts on the hands of small boys. The warts of the toad's skin of course bear no relation to the warts to which the human skin is subject."

BIDS READ ON BUS FRANCHISE

Three Offers Considered By City Council Last Night

Three street bus franchise bids were opened last night at a meeting of the city council and were referred to a meeting of the council as a whole. It was announced that the bids will be taken up within two or three days.

A bid received from Rex Norner offered two per cent of the gross returns received from bus service within the city to the city treasury. Routes which will receive bus service were not specified, but the bid stated that buses would be operated every half hour from 6:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m., each hour from 8:30 p. m. to 11:30 p. m., and at least one every hour on Sundays.

Ten Cent Fare
In a bid received from E. C. Wheeler, P. R. Halderman and L. H. Graham, all of Astoria, Ore., it was specified that Pelican City, Mills Addition, and South Sixth street would be served. This bid allowed the city two per cent of the gross receipts yearly. This bid also provided for a bus every 15 minutes from 6:30 until 8:00 p. m. and every 20 minutes from 8:00 p. m. until 11:30 p. m. Wheeler is general manager of the Astoria Transit company.

W. E. Young, who is now operating a bus line in Portland, offered the city one per cent of the gross receipts in a bid. This bid also contained 20 minute service until after 8:00 p. m. when there would be a car leave all terminals every 45 minutes.

All the bids provided for a maximum fare of 10 cents, special tickets to school children, and service to start within 90 days after the awarding of the contract.

U. S. to Buy Site
Upon the recommendation of the council as a whole, ordinances were passed authorizing the city to enter into contracts with Hartenbower Bros. of La Grande, for sewer units 3 and 4, and with Dunn and Baker for units 5A and 5B, all units of the new trunk line sewer system being installed within the city.

A letter was read at the meeting from George Neuner, United States attorney, in which definite assurance was given that the site of land on Seventh and Walnut, proposed for the new federal building, would be purchased by the government. An ordinance providing for the vacation of the alley in this block, which has been pending the assurance that the land would be purchased, was given a third reading and passed.

An ordinance was passed providing for the sale and delivery of \$150,000 worth of sewer bonds. This is the balance of the \$300,000 bonds voted by the city for the construction of the new sewer system.

Approve Contracts
Form of the contracts was read which will be used by the city when entering into an agreement with residents outside the city who wish to connect their property to the city sewerage system, and was approved.

After some discussion, the council agreed to let merchants of the city, who are constructing marquees in front of their business houses, make them 10 feet wide and 8 feet high. These are the specifications generally favored by the merchants.

J. J. Pree was granted a permit to operate a barber shop at the corner of Eighth and Klamath avenue.

Twenty-seven building permits, aggregating \$20,215, were approved.

PUMICE SHIPPED FROM KLAMATH

Klamath Reservation Indian Gathers Deposits

BEND, Ore., May 14—Pumice hauled into the heavens long ago by erupting mountains of Central Oregon is finding a ready market. It is indicated by the activities of Joe Ball, a Klamath reservation Indian, who is sacking pumice in northern Klamath county, about 81 miles south of Bend, and is shipping the soft volcanic material by New York for commercial purposes. The pumice is being gathered from deposits of this material near The Dalles-Cathlamet highway.

Last year, extensive pumice "mining" operations were carried on in the Crockett country and an effort was made to have the Southern Pacific railroad build a spur line into the deposits. However, it is said that the railroad company asked for a \$15,000 deposit before starting construction operations and the working plans collapsed.

Pumice is used variously, and is especially good in polishing and sandblasting operations, it is said.
