

GIRL HAD BEEN WARNED ABOUT MEN, PARTIES

Delphine Walsh Failed to Take Advice; Illegal Operation Fatal

LOS ANGELES, May 14. (U P)—The affection of a woman wise in the ways of the stage for a young girl who came from an Arizona mining camp to seek success behind the footlights, entered the investigation of the death of Delphine Walsh today.

Mildred Harris, once the wife of Charlie Chaplin, told medical association investigators of the warning against men and parties that she had given the pretty dancer who died after an illegal operation.

Miss Harris' story, revealing her intimate knowledge of the girl's home life, was a direct contradiction of her previous testimony that she knew her in only a professional way. She was recalled because her earlier statements conflicted with those of others questioned.

The actress said that she constantly advised the girl to avoid the men who crowd about stage doors with flowers and offers of parties.

"Delphine was sweet and beautiful," Miss Harris said. "I would have done anything in the world to have prevented her trouble. She didn't tell me. I guess she thought I would tell her mother. In the smaller towns Delphine and I roomed together, but I did not know she was attending drinking parties. I do not know who the man responsible for her death is."

Dr. P. S. Traxler and R. S. Lantierman, named by the girl before she died as the physicians who performed the operation, will be arraigned in Glendale Tuesday.

COLLEGE GIRL GETS MILLIONS

CHICAGO, May 14. (U P)—Miss Rosemary Baur, 18, became Chicago's richest girl today when a fortune estimated at \$2,500,000 was turned over to her control.

The money represents two-thirds of the estate of her father, the late Jacob Baur, who owned the Liquid Carbonic company. The widow received one-third of the estate.

Mrs. Baur, who had assumed management of the company after her husband's death, sold their holdings two years ago for \$4,000,000.

Rosemary, a student at Bryn Mawr college, boarded a train for the east after the court order awarding her the fortune was issued.

CONSTRUCTION UNDER WAY ON N. C. O. PROJECT

Cost of Improvement Will Approximate \$1,100,000

ALTURAS, Cal., May 14.—Reconstruction of the N. C. O. railway for the purpose of handling increased traffic following the connection of the line with the Southern Pacific from Klamath Falls is under way with a steam shovel in operation at the site of the new rail yards south of this city.

J. D. Mathews, assistant engineer of the department of maintenance of way of the Southern Pacific company will be here tomorrow to take charge of the work of reconstructing the line. This program will call for the expenditure of \$1,100,000, the work on the yards here costing about a third of that sum.

Contracts are now being arranged for the other phases of the work between here and Wendell, and full crews are expected to be placed on the line within a few days.

The construction of the main line between here and Paola calls for the elimination of a tangent in such a manner as to leave the present tracks some distance west of the new roadbed. The yards will be built between the present line and the new trackage.
