GEORGE DIXON KNOCKS WILLIE FELDMAN GOLD

Portland Negro Hammers Way to Sensational Victory

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15. (A.P.)—George Dixon, Portland, underdog in his comeback last night by knocking out Willie Feldman, New York, in the sixth round of their scheduled 10-round main event. They are middleweights. Dixon fought with the old tigerish fury he displayed a year ago and his deadly right was much in evidence. Until the final round, Feldman fought back, pumping a swift, punishing left hand against the negro's nose and frequently measured his wide-open jaw with one-two punches direct to the chin. But he could make no impression on Dixon and only seemed to spur the latter on. In the sixth, after a good start, Feldman was nearly knocked out by a straight right, and a great rally. The punishment he took showed in the sixth and Dixon soon had him between the ropes, the referee stopping the battle.

Two of the five preliminaries ended in knockouts. Jack Swenson, Victoria, B. C., clipped George Golden, Missoula, Mont., on the chin in the second round and dropped him for the count. Ray Hoffman, Seattle, knocked out Harold Westover, St. Helens, in the second with a right smash to the left of the stomach. Al Richmond, St. Helens, took a quick decision from Joe Smith, Seattle, four rounds. Jimmy Kayser, Seattle, and Harry Edelman, Portland, drew four rounds, as did Frankie Warlock and Jack Kentworth, Seattle.

A crowd of two thousand saw the card which was held in the Auditorium.

Walter Hagen Out In Front In Golf Match

MOORTOWN, Eng., May 15. (A.P.)—Still playing in brilliant form, Walter Hagen, American Ryder cup team captain and four times British open champion, scored a 70 today to take the lead among the qualifiers for the Yorkshire Evening News thousand guineas golf tournament. Hagen's 70, combined with his 69 of yesterday, gave him a two-hole total of 139, five strokes ahead of two other Americans, Ted Diegel and Al Watrous, who were tied with 144.

After a bad series of holes for the first nine, Horton Smith recovered on the second sufficiently to get a fair score. His outward score of 41 included an eight but he finished with a birdie four for a total of 77 and 38 hole score of 152 which assured him qualification.

Veteran Bowler Has Topped 13 Million Pins



PHIL WOLF HAS BOWLED ALMOST DAILY FOR FORTY YEARS AND HAS TOPPED APPROXIMATELY THIRTEEN MILLION PINS, AVERAGE OF 200, A REMARKABLE ACHIEVEMENT.

"Not since the days when Rip Van Winkle broke into a bowling box score has the grand old game produced such a colorful ten-pinner as Phil Wolf," remarked Rocky Wolfe during a fanning bee the other day.

"During his forty-year career, Wolf has topped approximately 13,000,000 pins. By bowling almost daily for two decades in tournaments, leagues, special matches and practice it is easy to understand how Wolf has dropped such an amazing number of pins. He probably owns the world's record in this respect. Incidentally his life-time average is better than 200.

Unlike the majority of good bowlers, Wolf does not look at the pins when he starts to roll. Instead he picks out a spot on the alley and plays it entirely.

Although he is 5 feet 10 inches tall, and weighs only 155 pounds, he is one of the biggest heavyweights who ever tossed a ball on the polished runways.

Report Shows Millions Are Stock Owners

WASHINGTON, May 15. (UP)—How widely the average citizen has become a shareholder in the country's big business is shown in a report today by a committee of economic experts, of which President Hoover was the chairman, which estimates the number of stock owners in business enterprises at over 17,000,000. The number was only 2,000,000 after the war.

The report comments also on the widespread investment by the average citizen of his savings in the stock market, but reaches no conclusion on the controversial speculative situation, except to say that a "credit stringency" is indicated. It explains there is popular confidence in the federal reserve system, and says the ability of the system to move available credit where it is needed is among the advances of recent years.

IMMEDIATE ANCESTOR OF MAN DISCOVERED PEKING, China, May 15. (UP)—Recent discoveries of fossils near here have revealed almost to a certainty the immediate ancestor of man, Walter Granger, of the American museum of national history, told the United Press today.

The opinion of Granger, who is a paleontologist, was affirmed by most of the internationally known scientists assembled here to study the so-called "Peking man", who they believe was the long sought "missing link."

CROWDS CHEER AS KING COMES BACK TO CITY

Tears of Happiness Flow As Monarch Parades In London

WINDSOR, Eng., May 15. (A.P.)—King George came back to his own fireside in this ancient home of British sovereigns today like a conquering hero.

All Windsor and the surrounding countryside were out to welcome their monarch back after his long illness which for many weary months had kept him from them.

The King, accompanied by Queen Mary, had a remarkable reception throughout the two and a quarter hours trip from Craigwell house, Bogor, where the king had spent several months of convalescence. But it remained for the "old home town" to outdo all the others as it welcomed again its most prominent resident.

Thousands of cheering spectators including 2,000 school children, and 1,000 Eton boys in silk hats and quack jackets, lined the ancient thoroughfare. As the royal car drove through, bags of rose petals were emptied from windows and fell in a crimson cascade about the machine.

It was the first time most of the inhabitants of Windsor had seen the king since the beginning of his illness late last year. All along the line there were cries of "God Bless Your Majesty," and "Welcome Home," while there were tears on many faces.

The King and Queen were smiling happily as they bowed towards the white sea of fluttering handkerchiefs and once or twice the Queen brushed moisture from her eyes.

At the bottom of Castle Hill which rises steeply up towards the ancient grey stone pile were waiting the mayor of his golden chains of office with his aldermen. The royal car halted and the smiling face of the ruler appeared. He grasped the hand of the mayor as he said:

"Thank you very much. We are very pleased to be back in Windsor and I am very glad to see so many citizens here."

The king shook hands with the rest of the delegation and the car then swung up the hill towards home.

WASHINGTON, May 15. (UP)—Dwight F. Davis, secretary of war in the Coolidge cabinet, is the most likely choice for governor general of the Philippines and announcement of his selection apparently awaits information as to whether he would accept the post.

Mr. Davis' name has been suggested in connection with an ambassadorial appointment to one of major European countries and there had been little conjecture connecting his name with that of a successor to Henry L. Stimson, now secretary of state.

Charge Faces James Cruze, Film Director

LOS ANGELES, May 15.—James Cruze, famous film director, may be tried on a charge of criminal negligence or manslaughter as a result of the explosion which cost the life of one man and injured three others during the filming of "Old Ironsides" three years ago.

Lucien Wheeler, chief of the district attorney's investigators, was attempting to learn whether Cruze's action in ordering the explosion constituted criminal negligence or manslaughter, and if the blast was premature.

Officials of the Paramount Famous Players Lasky Corporation, which owned the ill-fated Brig Llewellyn J. Morse at the time the dynamite was exploded, may be included.

During the filming of a battle between "Old Ironsides" and a barbed wire fort, Charles Gerald Davis, Ernest Olsen, Eric R. Johnson and Harry Broyles were sent to perilous perches on a yard arm, 50 feet above the water. In the scene a falling mast brushed them to the water and Davis was killed.

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LEGION FIGHTS ON PROFITEERS OF "NEXT WAR"

Nation's Industry Should Be Subject to Draft

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Insisting that the nation's industry as well as the prospective dough-boy should be subject to draft under the war department's conscription bill, the American Legion today launched a determined offensive against the "profiteer of the next war."

A bill introduced in the house Monday at the request of Secretary of War Good by Rep. James, Mich., authorizes the president to induct into the armed forces of the United States such male persons "as he may deem necessary" who have declared their intention to become citizens.

To the disappointment of the Legion's representatives in Washington, as voiced by John Thomas Taylor, vice-chairman of its national legislative committee, the bill makes no reference to war-time conscription or control of industry.

"Equal service from all, and special profit for none" has been the watchword of the Legion since the war," Taylor said in a statement issued today. "This is provided under the universal draft bill, which the Legion has backed for seven years, and which is now pending in congress under the name of the Reed-Wainwright resolution."

MOTORISTS CAN REACH END OF LAKE O' WOODS

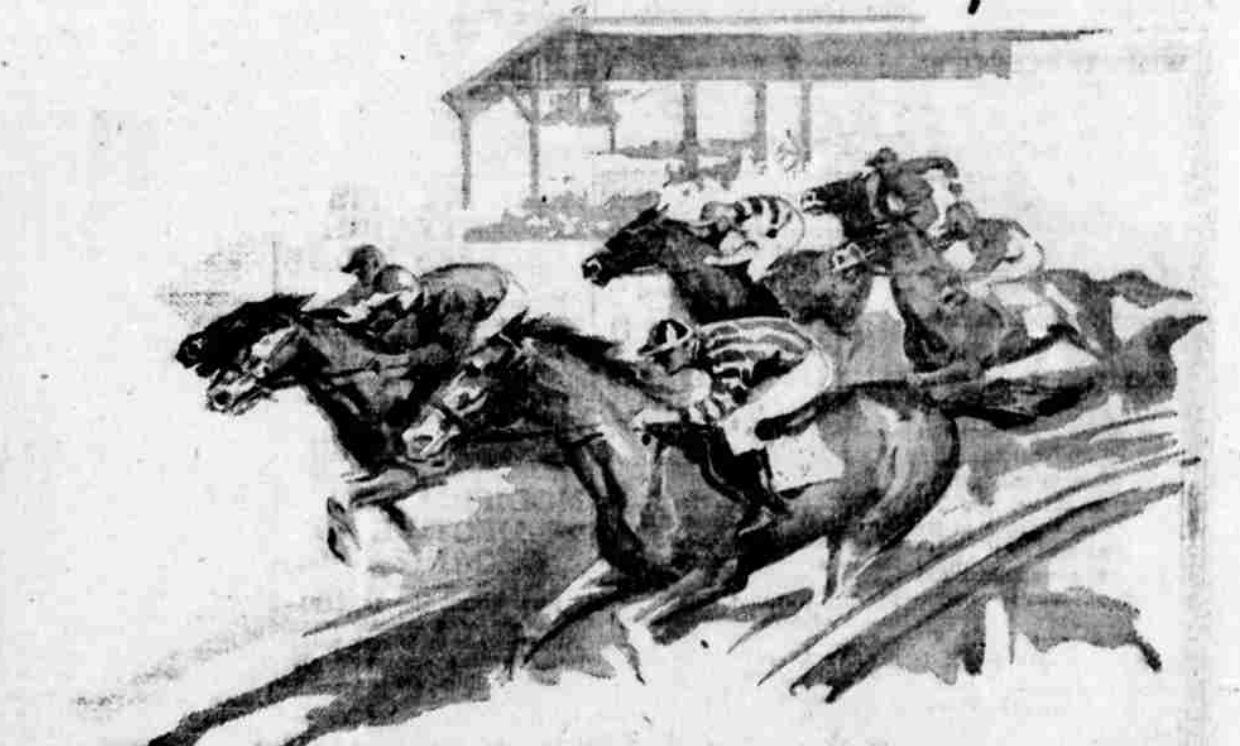
