

New Buildings Being Erected in Chiloquin

A building program wherein the combined sums being expended will total in excess of \$100,000 is under way in Chiloquin. Both business blocks and new homes are included in this activity.

Among the major enterprises is a new cement block structure being completed by J. H. Hoenig at the corner of First Avenue and Chockoot street, at a cost of \$35,000. In size it is 101 by 106 feet and plans call for the lower floor to be divided into store rooms and garage space, while the second story is designed for a fraternal hall and smaller rooms.

The Chiloquin garage, T. R. Markwardt and F. G. Markwardt, proprietors, has just started work on a combined garage and service station which will have a general floor space 50 by 107 1/2 feet in size.

Cement blocks will be used in the walls and the cost has been placed at \$15,000. One corner of the structure will be used for the service station. The latest equipment will be installed in the new garage, while the usual conveniences in rest rooms will be provided for the traveling public.

Expenditures for additions to the high and grade school buildings in Chiloquin have become necessary and the total outlay in this direction has been estimated at \$25,000.

Ten fine new homes in the Bray addition will cost \$17,000, while the Chiloquin Plumbing company and the Mill Work Supply are each disbursing \$2,000 in building operations.

State Dry Law of Wisconsin Is Abolished

MADISON, Wis., May 16, (UP)—Victorious in a bitter fight with the drys in the senate, the wet forces in the Wisconsin legislature turned over the bill repealing the state dry law to Gov. Walter J. Kohler for his signature.

The bill, previously passed in the lower house, was passed in the senate today.

A motion of non-concurrence in the assembly was voted down, 17 to 19, and five amendments aimed to weaken the bill were rejected. The vote on concurrence was 21 to 9.

The governor must approve or veto the bill within six days or allow it to become a law without his signature.

TEXAS SLOWS DERBY RACERS

ANSON, Texas, May 16, (UP)—Capturing the forty-sixth lap of C. C. Pyle's hunkin' trot today, John Salo, Pascale, N. J., policeman, cut 19 minutes from the lead of Pete Gavuzzi, bearded Italian of England, running the 29.5 miles from Albany to Anson in 5:08:05.

Gavuzzi was fourth today in 5:27:05. Herbert Hedeman, oldest man in the field, and Sam Richman, both of New York, were tied for second in 5:21:10.

The lap was run beneath a blazing Texas sun, which slowed the pavement pounders considerably.

Veteran Named Indian Official



For 27 years A. G. McMillan, above, has been in the Indian Service of the government. FIGHTS OF GREAT MEN DESCRIBED

LONDON, May 16, (UP)—Bitter antagonism aroused during the drafting of the Versailles treaty almost brought him to blows with Lloyd George, Georges Clemenceau told a special correspondent of the London Daily Express, the newspaper said today.

"We were at each other like this," he demonstrated with animation, doubling his fists under the correspondent's chin. "Then President Wilson intervened and parted us declaring:

"Never in my life have I seen two such unreasonable men."

Stanley Baldwin will carry the British election, in the opinion of the aged statesman who declared Lloyd George was "unstable."

"He doesn't know what he wants—except violence," Clemenceau told the correspondent.

Noted Actress Committed to Special Ward

LOS ANGELES, May 16, (UP)—Asserted threats of Alma Rubens to commit suicide forced the screen actress' husband and mother to have her confined to the psychopathic ward at general hospital last night, the sheriff's office reported.

Miss Rubens' threats to take her own life were made when members of her family discovered that she had been using drugs again, it was said.

She will be removed to Patton state institution for the insane, early Thursday. This move also was requested by her husband, Ricardo Cortez, and her mother Mrs. Teresa Rubens, in their last desperate effort to save her from the habit which wrecked her brilliant career.

An unscrupulous drug peddler suspected of selling the actress narcotics, was being hunted throughout Los Angeles county.
