

BUSINESS MEN WILL INSPECT SOVIET NATION

Borah and Adherents Expect Move Will End in Recognition

WASHINGTON, May 17 (UP)—A delegation of leading American business men will visit Russia during July and August for a survey of economic conditions. The trip, which has been approved by the Senate, is the first of its kind since the revolution 12 years ago and with a view of recognition when the Soviet came into power.

The trip occasionally has aroused keen interest among those desiring recognition of the Soviet republic. These include Senator Borah of Idaho, Chairman of the foreign relations committee, who regards the mission as a most promising contribution to his campaign for Russian recognition. It is the first of its kind since the revolution 12 years ago and with a view of recognition when the Soviet came into power.

VALENCE, France, May 17. (AP)—After flying to the outskirts of the city the zeppelin was brought to a standstill by the violence of the wind, which was sweeping it eastward. At 4:15 p. m. (10:15 a. m. E. S. T.) she was over the little community of Crest, about 15 miles southeast of here.

Her motors appeared for a moment to have stopped entirely. Then she got under way again. Her situation, after heading toward the Valley of the Drome, appeared to be very grave indeed.

Pickwick stages, Southern Pacific Motor Transport company, Oregon stages and Pacific stages, and lines from Los Angeles to El Paso and San Francisco to Salt Lake City. One third ownership will be held each by the Motor Transit Corporation of Chicago, the Pickwick Corporation and the Southern Pacific company.

Bus operations of Pickwick and Yellowbay between Los Angeles and Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, and St. Louis will be managed by the Pickwick-Greyhound corporations, with ownership divided between the Pickwick corporation and Motor Transit corporation, with headquarters at Kansas City.

All the companies involved will retain their individual identities but will be operated under combined control.

The Pacific Coast corporation will be headed by C. E. Wickman, Minneapolis, as chairman of the board. T. B. Wilson, formerly head of the Southern Pacific Motor Transport operations, will be president and C. F. Wren, Los Angeles, president of Pickwick, will be chairman of the executive committee. W. E. Travis will become chairman of the board of Motor Transit corporation, O. S. Caesar continuing as president and Chairman McCormick becoming chairman of the executive committee.

Premature announcement over-emphasized the importance of railroad interests in the merger," said the official announcement. "The Southern Pacific company comes in only through its ownership of a subsidiary bus operating company and its interests lie entirely and solely in the Pacific coast operations which parallel its rail lines."

The bus lines operated as a subsidiary of the Southern Pacific railway will be a party to the union.

Pacific coast operations of the new company will be controlled by Pacific Transportation securities, Inc. One third ownership will be held each by the Motor Transit corporation of Chicago, the Pickwick corporation and the Southern Pacific company.

The final decree was granted on a cross complaint charging desertion, filed by the wife yesterday. It climaxed action instituted two years ago by Wingfield, in which he claimed Mrs. Wingfield preferred to live in San Francisco instead of here.

POLAND BLAZE KILLS HUNDRED

WARSAW, Poland, May 17. (AP)—More than 4,000 persons are homeless and destitute as a consequence of the burning of almost the entire township of Lwów, on the eastern frontier of Poland.

LIFE STORY OF ENGLISH KING IS SUPPRESSED

LONDON, May 17. (UP)—The Star said yesterday that a new life story of King George had been prohibited officially because it trespassed on the private life of his majesty.

The intimate details of the story also betrayed the identity of the author, the newspaper said.

It was written by "someone close in association with the royal family" and was scheduled to appear late this year in serial form in a London newspaper and in the dominions and the United States.

Proofs of the biography were submitted to the king, whose disapproval resulted in cancellation of all contracts, the newspaper said.
