BOTH SIDES IN MOCK CLASH CLAIM VICTORY

COLUMBUS, O., May 17 (UP)—

With both sides claiming victory in the first major engagement of the army-air-ground maneuvers yesterday, the battle of the air between the red army aircraft defending the province of Columbus and the blue air forces of the state of Dayton was expected to reach a climax today.

Accompanied by 21 fast pursuit ships, five Keystone bombers, each armed with six machine guns and carrying more than a ton of high explosive bombs from the red camp at Norton field here, descended today upon Fairfield airport near Dayton, base of the blue army.

Major John N. Reynolds who gained distinction during the World War while leading the third army observation group, said he was optimistic over the outcome of the combat. His side having "bombed" enemy railroads running through Dayton and Piqua, Reynolds, commander of the red army planes said this would deprive the enemy of much-needed supplies.
