BASIN PIONEER TO APPEAR IN LARGE PAGEANT

Captain O. C. Applegate
Accepts Invitation of
Eugene Committee

EUGENE, May 17.—Captain O. C. Applegate, noted pioneer of Klamath Falls, will take the principal part in Eugene's big pageant, "Sunset Trail," to be staged July 25, 26 and 27. It was announced yesterday by Cal M. Young, chairman of the committee on pioneers.

Mr. Young wrote to Captain Applegate a few days ago and yesterday received a reply accepting the place. "I cannot think of anything that would prevent my accepting the honor you offer me," the captain writes.

Captain Applegate will take the place in the "Sunset Trail" given to the late Ezra Meeker in the Trail and Fall celebration three years ago. It is announced. The captain attended that celebration in Eugene and was conspicuous in the parades and other features of the big affair.

The Grants Pass Cavemen, a marching organization, have written to Mr. Young in answer to an invitation to take part in the parade, that they appreciate the invitation and will take the matter up at a meeting to be held in the near future. The Cavemen attracted a great deal of attention in the Trail to Fall parades. The men were armed in wild animal skins and carried clubs such as pre-historic cavemen were supposed to carry.

PARK BEETLE CAMP OPENED

FORT KLAMATH, Ore., May 17.—A pine beetle camp is being opened at Sand Creek entrance of Crater Lake park by Lee P. Brown of the Medford office of the United States forest service. The park service and forest service are co-operating in an attempt to stop the beetle epidemic now destroying the lodge-pole timber near and inside the park.

P. J. Jaenecke of the Portland office of the forest service, insect control specialist, is assisting Mr. Brown in organizing the forest service share of the work. They will employ 20 men one month and spend \$3000.

JAMES L. QUINN GETS CONTRACT

Awarded Mills Addition
School Job

Although his bid was not low, James L. Quinn, Klamath Falls contractor, was awarded the contract for the construction of a seven-room addition at Mills addition school, at a special meeting of the school board last night.

Members of the board explained that Mr. Quinn was granted the contract by virtue of his experience in school construction in Klamath Falls. His bid was \$23,554. Bidders who were lower than Mr. Quinn had not constructed schools in Klamath. William Lorenz was awarded the plumbing contract, while the Carleton Electric company, secured the contract for the electrical installation.

G. M. C. Takes Large Share Fokker Stock

NEW YORK, May 17. (UP)—General Motors corporation has acquired a 40 per cent interest in the Fokker Aircraft Corporation of America, James A. Talbot, chairman of the board of directors of the Fokker company announced last night. The interests amounts to 400,000 shares of Fokker stock.

In payment General Motors is turning over to Fokker all the capital stock of the Dayton-Wright company, which lists as assets McCook field at Dayton, Ohio, a large number of patents in the aviation industry and additional cash assets of approximately \$6,500,000.

WILSON NAMED STUDENT HEAD

Results of Klamath Union
High School Election
Announced

Ben Wilson will head the associated students of the Klamath Union high school next year, it was announced last night after a close student body election in which the vote was badly split.

Wilson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wilson, prominent residents of this city. He will enter his senior year at the high school at the opening of the fall term in September.

Officers elected to serve with Wilson are: Harry Sprague, first vice-president; Jean Robertson,

second vice-president; Harriet Hunter, secretary treasurer; Mary Dougherty, Krater manager; Hubert Totten, editor of the annual; and Herbert Graham, business manager of the annual.

Two proposed amendments to the school constitution also passed by a majority vote. The first provides that each year, some time during the month of September, the student body shall elect an assistant manager for the annual and the Krater. The assistant shall automatically become manager, recommends said promotion, and that the assistant manager receives a vote of confidence from the student body. The assistant shall be of junior class standing at the time of election.

The second amendment was that "the name of the association shall be 'The Associated Students of Klamath Union High School.'"
