U. S. SENATOR OFFERS TO AID KLAMATH FALLS

Senator Steiwer Gives Present Status of Federal Building

"Have been following up matter Federal building site for Klamath Falls and have just been advised abstracts of title have been approved and together with related papers have been forwarded by United States Attorney, George Neuner to Treasury department yesterday. After title is vested in government it requires approximately 6 months for survey and for drawing plans and specifications. Will keep you advised of developments in situation. Earnestly desire to be of all possible assistance."

Above is the copy of a wire received today from Frederick Steiwer, United States Senator to the chamber of commerce.

Despite the fact, Senator Steiwer believes it will require six months for survey, the Federal building committee of the chamber of commerce have already taken care of many detailed matters which will help to rush the survey through in less time.

The survey has been worked upon for several months by the committee, with the result that many departments to be placed in the building have already been reported to the various departments.

The space required by the postoffice, reclamation office, department of agriculture, forest department office, county agent, United States commissioner and several other departments has already been outlined to proper authorities.

The Federal building will be located on lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, taking in three-quarters of a block between Walnut and Oak. A check for \$22,100 was given the Oregon-California and Eastern railroad for the site several days ago.

United States District Attorney, George Neuner was here for the completion of the sale.

"I will say, however, that I did not solicit Mrs. Smith's business. I was called to Seattle for the purpose of conferring with her. I have rendered Mrs. Smith a faithful and valuable service, extending over a long period of time, and fully expect to be paid for it."

In her complaint Mrs. Smith charged that Burdick had accepted from her \$3,500 to cover a mortgage, and that this mortgage had not been recorded. In commenting upon this Burdick said: "This, like the other charges, is false and malicious. Had those who prepared the complaint not confined their search to Deschutes county, but had examined the records of Crook county, they would have found the mortgage duly recorded and property assigned to Mrs. Smith."
