A Brilliant Air Record

NATIONAL AIR TRANSPORT, which flies air mail planes between New York, Cleveland, Chicago, Kansas City and Dallas, has just completed the third year of its operations, and is celebrating by revealing the figures that its three years' work have rolled up. They reflect an enormous amount of credit on the company and on aviation as a whole.

In three years, N. A. T. planes have flown 4,674,343 miles, of which 1,624,445 were at night. They have carried a total of 2,113,303 pounds of mail and 105,959 pounds of express. At present they are averaging 6500 miles of flight every day.

National Air Transport has a right to be very proud of this record. It demonstrates clearly the way in which aviation has established itself in this country.

HUGE TRACT OF PINE IS SOLD

as the finest large tract of pine timber in the west. Timber in the country is 95 per cent pine; logging conditions are ideal in most sections; and cruisers have computed that the timber runs 45 per cent upper grades. Mr. Kesterson is one of the most successful pine operators in the Klamath basin. At one time he ran a mill at Topsy grade and later moved his plant to Dorris where he has conducted an efficient operation.

The purchase of the middle unit of the Yamsey mountain tract, leaves still another unit of about one half billion feet for, which certain big interests are now negotiating, it is reported.

The Lamm Lumber company of Modoc Point bought the west slope unit of the Yamsey tract last year. The tract approximates 600,000,000 and at this time Mr. Lamm is constructing a 25-mile logging railroad across Klamath marsh at a cost of about \$300,000 to tap his timber.

These two purchases by active operators open up a tract of pine timber which has been lying dormant.

One of the interesting features of both the Lamm purchase and the Kesterson purchase is that it is understood both companies will virtually double their output.

Cost of the middle unit was not announced but it was revealed that the total cost of both the west slope tract and the middle unit approximated \$7,000,000.

Mr. Kesterson is expected to announce in the near future his final plans for logging his tract.

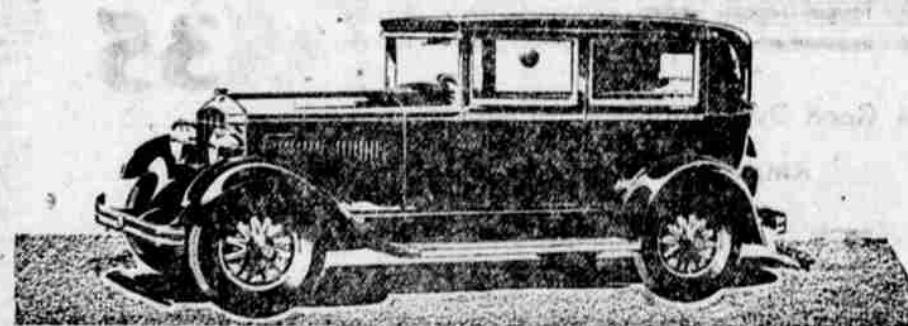
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
