## WILBUR WANTS COMMITTEE TO STUDY SCHOOLS

WASHINGTON, May 18, (UP)—Appointment of a committee of school heads to study the federal government's place in educational work and recommend legislation to congress has been suggested to President Hoover by Secretary of the Interior Wilbur. It was learned yesterday.

Wilbur suggested that all agencies of the government dealing in education be placed under an assistant secretary in the cabinet.

Wilbur's recommendation follows a statement made two weeks ago opposing a department of education. He said the government should study school methods and advise rather than dictate educational change to the states.

WASHINGTON, May 18, (UP)—A national tax investigation committee was appointed today at the final session of the American Farm Bureau Federation's conference on taxation.

Claims that the American farmers are paying as much as 15 per cent more taxes than imposed on city property owners on real estate of equal valuation were made during the conference. The committee will report on its findings to the eleventh annual meeting of the federation here next December.
