RUTH, GEHRIG CRACK HOMERS TO WIN GAME

Athletics Also Chalk Up Win; Cardinals Shade Cincinnati

(By The Associated Press.)
Although rain swept out the Eastern schedule of the National league yesterday, the Yankees managed to beat the storm by a half at the Ruppert Stadium to defeat the Red Sox 3 to 0 as the Athletics shut out the Senators in Washington by 7 to 0. The Yankees victory, the third over the Bostonese in two days, was a legal game only because of the early start made in view of the scheduled double headed.

The game was ended by rain after two New York batters had been retired in the fifth.

Hit Homers
Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig raked Jack Russell for successive home runs in the third, and Fred Heimach was turning back the Boston invaders with regularity. The Babe's blow was his seventh, Gehrig's his ninth.

Although the champions gained nothing on the victorious muckmen, who swept their Washington series, the Ruppert lines were established more securely in second place. The Browns ran into an afternoon of indifferent pitching, and saw the Cleveland Indians grab a 10 to 6 decision. That left the Browns one full game behind the Yankees and two and one half contests to the rear of the muckmen.

The White Sox turned the tables on Detroit at Navin Field, winning by 19 to 3, but the Chicago team lost the services of its star outfielder, Johnny Mostil, who snapped the bone in his right ankle in the fourth as he slid over the plate. Lyons pitched for Chicago.

Walberg Good
The final victory of the Athletics in Washington was made possible by the fine box work of George Walberg, who gave the Senators only seven scattered hits. The Maeks hammered Burke, Hopkins and Marberry to score their seven runs.

The Cardinals narrowed the National league fight for the top by shading Adolfo Luque and the Reds at Cincinnati, 2 to 1, as Burleigh Grimes pitched the Pirates to a 4 to 1 decision at Wrigley Field. This left the Bruins a margin on only half a game over the Red Birds.

Grimes victory was his sixth of the season without a defeat. The Giant-Reds postponement in Brooklyn was rescheduled for today.

RAILROAD WINS LARGE LAWSUIT

possession was ended in the highest court in a substantial defeat for the commerce commission.

In ending the controversy the court overturned the valuations used by the commission for rate-making and other purposes which are approximately eleven billion dollars, less than claimed by the railroads. Under it the commission must scrap its valuation of years, conducted at great expense to the government and prepare new valuations giving consideration to reproduction values.

The opinion will, according to the government, result in a rapid revision of rates, although counsel for the railroads, during argument of the case, emphatically denied that it necessarily would result in higher tariffs. These asserted that the railroads would be controlled by what the traffic could bear.

Cost of reproduction at prevailing prices was accepted by the court as an element in railroad valuations. It was stated that such cost was an important item to be given consideration in determining valuations.

Justice Holmes, Brandeis and Stone dissented from the majority opinion.

NEW YORK, May 29 (AP)—Announcement of the supreme court's decision in the St. Louis and O'Fallon case was heralded in Wall street today as an extraordinary "bullish" development of profound importance in the financial history of the American railroads.

Washington city to take the man in custody.

Good is charged with having wedded a Klamath woman while he was still married. His wife, according to the district attorney's office, resides in Indiana where Good for several years was pastor of a church.

Investigation disclosed, the district attorney's office said, that Good had attempted to secure a divorce in Medford from his wife under the alias of Goodrich but that the decree had no effect due to the fact that he used the wrong name.

Good left Klamath Falls suddenly several weeks ago and a short time later a charge of polygamy was filed against him.

By virtue of continual wiring to various law enforcement agencies in Oregon, Washington and Canada, Sheriff Low traced Good's movements from one city to the other.

Good's arrest was brought about, Sheriff Low said, when he left word in a Washington town to have mail addressed to E. J. Goodrich forwarded to D. J. Good—his right name—in Spokane.

Good took an active part in civic affairs in Klamath Falls and was employed first in a real estate office and later at an automobile agency. Shortly after his arrival in Klamath Falls he took charge of a charity drive and raised more money for that cause than had ever before been raised in Klamath Falls.

SPokane, Wash., May 29, (AP)—E. J. Goodrich, former minister of Klamath Falls, Ore., was arrested here today by sheriff's officers on a telegraphic felony warrant. He talked to his wife by long distance telephone, and she told him there was a bigamy charge against him. Goodrich told officers there were no grounds for such a charge in Oregon, and that he had his final divorce decree from his first wife.

CHICAGO, May 29.—There are two pitchers in the American League whose departure for other places would be particularly welcome to "Goose" Goslin, Washington outfielder, who led the league in batting last season. They are Walter Miller, with Cleveland, and Earl Whitehill, with Detroit, both left-handers.

"All pitchers are hard to hit, understand, but those two fellows are particularly hard for me," he says. "I got a 4-0-0 against Miller at Cleveland on the first western road trip and Whitehill did the same to me at Detroit. And my past average against these two guys isn't anything to brag about. OFFICERS MUST PAY DAMAGES

PORTLAND, May 29, (AP)—The entire \$15,000 for which E. C. Martin, musician, sued Patrolmen Blake, Cambas, Jacques, Cart and Briler of the Portland police force, was awarded him in a sealed verdict opened in circuit court.

By order of the court the suit against Jacques was dismissed. The jury decided that Cambas, Cart and Briler should pay \$250 each, and that Blake should pay \$14,250.

The suit was for false imprisonment growing out of the arrest of Martin on the morning of Oct. 14, 1928 after Blake had shot him. Martin was entering the door of his apartment when the policeman fired.

POPPY SALE TO OPEN MAY 25TH

High School Girls Will Canvass Business Section

Annual sale of the red poppy by the American Legion Auxiliary opens Saturday, May 25th, according to announcement made today by Mrs. George Barth.

A bevy of pretty high school girls will be stationed on the streets, in stores, business blocks and banks.

Proceeds of the sale will go directly to the United States Veterans Hospital, No. 77 of Portland, where a number of Klamath Falls boys are patients.

In the spring of 1919 after the Great World War, when the fighting had been most terrific and thousands of soldiers had fallen in battle, where not a tree stood and where the earth was torn by guns, beautiful red poppies came up in abundance.

French women believe that the red poppy is the symbol of the blood of boys who fell and died on Flanders Field.

Many who have traveled in France since the war have seen the fields of poppies.

Soldiers in the hospitals throughout the United States, and their families, are paid one cent for every poppy made.

The poppy is sold for ten cents or as much more as the person buying wishes to pay and all the money earned from the sale will be used towards helping disabled men, buying food, clothing and necessary things for their children.

The red poppy, to be sold next Saturday under the auspices of the Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion should be worn for three reasons:

First—As a tribute to the soldiers who died.

Second—It helps the sick and disabled men and their families to earn money for themselves.

Third—The money earned by the sale of these poppies provides warmth, food and clothing to the families of these men.

Mrs. Jennie Hurn and Mrs. George M. Barth have charge of arrangements for the sale next Saturday.

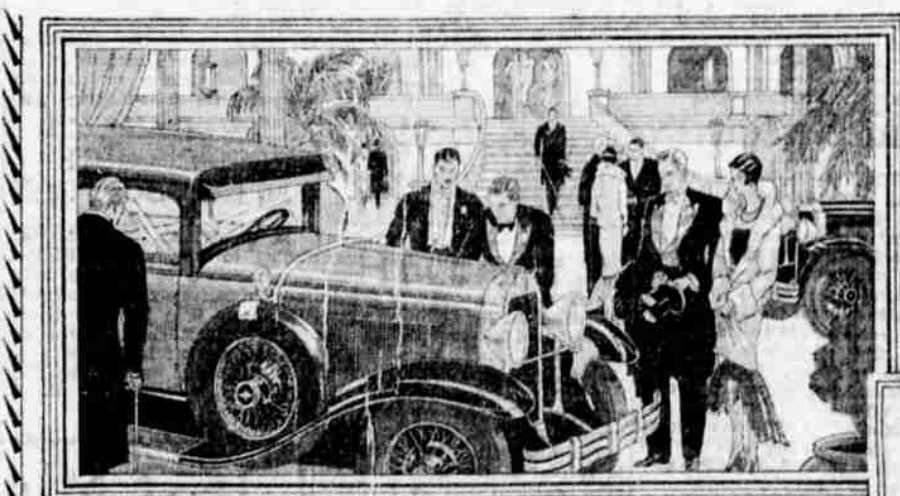

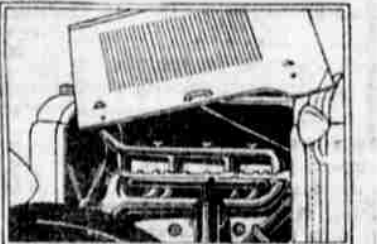
