Long Trips of Big Dirigible Postponed CITY OPPOSES G. N. EXTENSION

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 21. (AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener, master of the Graf Zeppelin, today said the massive dirigible would take no more long journeys until the failure of four of its motors last Friday had been sifted thoroughly and "absolutely clarification" of the mishap reached.

"I returned here to confer about the question of motors," the air liner's master said. "It is natural that so long as there isn't absolute clarification concerning the reasons for the motor defect the Graf Zeppelin will not undertake any long and extended journeys."

"I have a conference scheduled today with various department heads after which I shall make preparations to return to Toulon. We hope to bring the Graf back by Thursday or Friday. Two motors already have arrived in France and others here are ready for shipment."

Joining these organizations that are opposing the proposed paralleling rail extension of the Great Northern-Western Pacific from Klamath Falls to Keddie, the Richmond Chamber of Commerce, representing one of the most important industrial districts in the San Francisco bay area, has adopted a resolution opposing G. N. W. P. project as being a wasteful duplication of existing facilities.

The Richmond opposition points out that paralleling and duplicating rail lines are wasteful and uneconomic and may constitute a threat of added costs to the public.

The resolution scored G. N. W. P. proposal as an unnecessary capital investment which serves only to duplicate the existing facilities. It declared that the existing carrier whose great expenditures aggregating many millions of dollars have been made to develop the territory G. N.

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LAY PLANS FOR ROUTE SURVEY

MEDFORD, Ore., May 21. (A P.)—The selection of a chief engineer to have complete charge of the work of surveying a rail route for the Owen-Oregon Lumber company from Butte Falls to Klamath Falls, will be made soon, James H. Owen, general manager, said today. As soon as the selection is made a surveying crew under direction of the engineer, will be put into the field.

Owen said the entire responsibility of deciding the feasibility of the route would rest upon the chief engineer and that his figures on the estimated cost of the road would be the final word.

He is negotiating with a couple of engineers, Owen said. Both these men have built railroads in the northwest, the mill owner said, adding "and I think I have the man I want."

Owen said he will probably take all summer and fall to get an accurate line on the best route and the estimated costs.

Construction work, he said, if finally decided upon, will not start before next spring.
