

ENGLISH EARL PASSES AWAY

SPSOM, England, May 22, (A.P.)—The Earl of Rosebery, 82, former Liberal prime minister and one of the last of England's great victorians, died yesterday at his home, the Durdans, near here after a brief illness.

His death caused general sorrow hereabout, where the former premier's steadfast clinging to the habits of the eighties and his benign and sportsmanlike outlook on life had made him one of the best beloved of residents.

CATTLE ARRIVE TO PASTURE IN LARGE VALLEY

PORT KLAMATH, Oreg., May 22, (Special).—The first bunch of cattle came over the summit of the Cascades from Jackson county to Port Klamath, Nicholas Jones & Garrett sent over 210 head. Eight men drove them over in four days.

One Nichols, the man in charge of the drive, said that the snow was so soft that the cattle broke through every step. They ran into eight miles of snow ranging from two to five feet in depth at the summit. A man led a horse ahead and the cattle were driven after them through the snow. In the deepest parts three or four men scared 25 or 30 head of cattle through flint, then the big bunch was driven through the trail they broke. They came over the north fork of Little Butte creek to Fish Lake, over the divide to Lake and the Woods; down to Pelican bay and up the west side of Lake Klamath to Port Klamath. V. D. Brophy, manager of the Cattle company, has 550 head coming over the same trail.

SECOND ARREST IN CALF THEFT PROBE IS MADE
