**How Clean Is a Clean Street?**  
Christian Science Monitor: A committee called recently upon certain New York officials and asked that something be done about the streets. They are not, the committee insisted, as clean as they used to be. The officials replied, quite politely, that the street were cleaner than ever. "But they're not," the citizens protested. "Oh, indeed they are!" said the officials. Then someone asked: "Just how clean is clean streets?" No one knew the answer, so the committee packed up its opinions, shook hands with the officials and went home. The problem has recurred at intervals since 1696 when the first attempt was made in New York to hire a "municipal housewife" instead of leaving the care of the streets to the individual householders. The project would have cost \$150 a year, and the ordinance failed because that was considered too much money. Cities are now spending millions annually for street cleaning, but they utilize virtually the same "broom and dustpan" methods that have been in vogue for years. Water supply, sewerage and sanitation have been placed upon an engineering basis in an attempt to clear the atmosphere of dust clouds in the air. But street cleaning continues largely by rule of thumb. The problem needs to be approached from the standpoint of what causes the dirt as well as of finding ways to remove it. From such a point of view it involves much more than the casual litter which must be cleared away. It embraces the study of refuse disposal, ash removal, trucking, building construction, smoke control and many allied problems which are distinctly of an engineering character.

## Birth Control Will Stabilize Population In 50 Years Claim Prominent Social Scientists

OXFORD, O., May 22. (AP)—The population of the United States will become stabilized at 175,000,000 fifty years from now, largely because of the advance in birth control, social scientists predicted today. The next fifty years also will bring many changes in American cities and farms, they believe, and will improve living conditions of all classes.

Experts of the Scripps foundation for research in population problems made the report after seven years' study of birth and death rates in the United States. They have formed an absorbing picture of the nation's family life in 1975. Among the tentative conclusions they have reached are the following:

General application of birth control will tend to reduce and stabilize both the birth and death rates.

Great cities will reverse their tendency towards concentration and will begin to spread out over immense metropolitan areas, with better light and air for all.

The shift in population from farm to city will continue.

The population of the United States will reach 175,000,000 by 1975 and become stabilized at that point.

## FOUR CASES OF DEADLY DISEASE ARE REPORTED

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 22. (UP)—Four cases of spinal meningitis developed in Arizona during the week ending May 18, according to the state health board today.

The meningitis situation in Arizona for the most part is confined to southern Arizona, where one died at Nogales Monday, and two cases were reported from Douglas and one from Bisbee.

The fourth case was reported from Miami.

At Nogales where Feliciano Campos died, 53 other prisoners were exposed. They are under observation for symptoms of the malady.
