## RAIL RATES ON LIVESTOCK MAY BE INCREASED

Revision of Tariff Schedule in West Suggested by Examiners

WASHINGTON, May 22, (AP)—A revision of railroad freight rates on livestock in western territory which would involve some general but light increases has been recommended to the Interstate Commerce Commission by examiners who have completed an investigation into existing schedules.

C. E. Stiles and A. S. Parker, commission examiners, after a preliminary study, suggested a series of mileage scales in western territory to govern the making of new rates, and indicated that scales would increase railroad earnings. The commission assigned the report for oral argument here July 19.

"Livestock in much of the western district is not at present bearing its fair share of the transportation burden, of its new scales," the report said. "Under the rate levels herein recommended it will do no more than meet these minimum requirements. Taken as rate levels, we believe the scales recommended will be fair both to shippers and carriers."

### Suggested Rates.

Under the distance scale suggested by the report, shipments of cattle and hogs in double deck cars would be charged for at the rate of 11 cents per hundred pounds for distances of 10 miles; 12 cents per hundred pounds for distances of 500 miles; 62 cents for distances of 1,000 miles; \$1.62 for distances of 2,000 miles; and \$1.22 for distances of 2,500 miles; single deck shipments of calves and hogs would be charged 12 1/2 cents per hundred pounds for distances of 10 miles; 18 1/2 cents for 500 miles; 71 1/2 cents for 1,000 miles; 92 1/2 cents for distances of 1,500 miles and

SALEM, Ore., May 22, (AP)—Representatives of the state deaf association and some other Portland citizens appeared before the state board of control yesterday to protest against the administration of J. Lyman Steed as superintendent of the state school for the deaf. The complaint was that Steed is unable to keep teachers at the school and that 10 of the 13 teachers now employed will not be at the school next year.

The board will make an investigation, which will include interviewing the teachers, predecessors of Steed have had difficulty keeping teachers at the school because of the low salaries paid by Oregon as compared with deaf schools in other states.

Steed's administration has been unusually free from criticism.

Proportionate amounts were recommended for intervening distances in all of the scales, and, in addition, additional scales of arbitrary differentials to be added were laid down. For application in mountain and Pacific territory a slightly higher schedule of cattle rates was suggested than the mileage scale given.

## HARLAN WANTS INVESTIGATION OF OREGONIAN

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22, (U. P.)—Kenneth G. Harlan, public utility rate investigator employed to study rates of the Portland Electric Power company, today requested the Federal trade commission to investigate the Morning Oregonian which he charges with "championing the cause of power interests in the state of Oregon."

In a letter to the commission, Harlan said that in conducting an investigation for the city of Portland to secure lower power rates he was "encountering very great difficulty on account of false power propaganda broadcast against us by the Oregonian in both its news and editorial columns."
