CARDS DEFEAT CUBS FOR LEAD

Mitchell Pitches Great Ball, Gets Triple; A's Take Two

Clarence Mitchell, renowned as the only left handed spitballer in captivity gave further proof yesterday that this is not his only claim to fame. The Brooklyn castoff, always supreme in a crisis, pitched the Cardinals to a 4 to 3 decision over the Cubs at St. Louis in the season's first semi-crucial series, and thereby lifted his team into the lead over its Chicago opponent by a margin of half a game.

Pitcher Hits Triple

The veteran southpaw aided his own cause with a triple. He also received first class backing from Andy High, who hit a home run and two singles to drive in four runs.

Burleigh Grimes pitched for the Pirates against Cincinnati yesterday. This simple assertion is rapidly becoming synonymous with a statement to the effect that the Pirates won, which they did yesterday by 4 to 3. The Buccaneers thus enabled their big spit baller to enter his seventh successive victory into his credit column at the expense of Eppa Jetha Rixey. The Pirates, now only three games out of the lead, are the only club showing any signs at the moment of disputing Cub-Cardinal supremacy.

The Phillies and the Robins were idle yesterday, and the giants defeated The Braves by 11 to 4.

McGill's Happy

The day's campaign in the American league met with the full approval of Mr. Cornelius McGillicuddy, even though the Yankees defeated the Red Sox by 7 to 6 at Boston. Mr. McGillicuddy, the while, was engaged in the pleasant task of taking two from the Senators, each by a score of 9 to 8. The Browns got only an even break at Cleveland, winning by 7 to 5 after the Indians had managed to 4 to 3 defeat the Sox in the earlier game.

The double victory of the Athletics stretched the Mackian lead to three games over the Browns and four over the Yankees.

In a brilliant pitchers' battle at Recreation Park, the Mission Reds vanquished their old rivals, the Oaks, 2 to 6. For six and a third innings, husky Pete Daglia hurled no-hit no-run baseball, but a double in the seventh by Christensen yielded a run that broke the charm. The Missions were held to three hits, while the Oaks batted 4. Nelson pitched for the Reds.

Indians Beat Seals

The Seattle Indians, who still bring up the rear in the league standings, gave Hollis Thurston and Curt Davis a pounding and defeated the San Francisco Seals 10 to 6 in the camp of the Redskins.

The tribe now leads in this week's series, two games to one. Kyle Graham had a few bad moments in the third, and wobbled a little in the ninth when he grew careless. The Seals led until the fifth, when the Indians forged ahead.

OREGON DEFEATS HARVARD MEN IN TELEGRAPH GOLF

EUGENE, Ore., May 24, (AP)

Playing their first telegraphic golf match in history, University of Oregon golf team defeated Harvard University Wednesday, 123 points to 82. Oregon totaled 67 the first day of play and 56 the second, when Harvard made 39 and 43.

Points were awarded one for par on a hole, two for a birdie and three for an eagle. The official match score was Oregon 2, Harvard 1. Play was by team members according to ranking. Those winning matches were Moe, Will and Palmer for Oregon, and Baldwin for Harvard. Don Moe, Oregon captain, led the field for the webfoots yesterday with 18 points, scored on a card of 72.
