HUFFMAN AND CHURCH STEAL SHOW ON CARD

Two Boys Put Up Great Battle in Semi-Windup Last Night

While Church and May Huffman stole the show last night at the Legion boxing card by starting one of the most vicious and destructive fights ever witnessed in a Klamath ring. These two slugging young men wheeled away at each other for six rounds in the semi-windup and had the fans on their feet from the beginning to the end.

When the time keeper clanged the bell at the end of the fight, any fan could have stepped into the ring and blown either Huffman or Church over with a long breath—they were just that near all in. The bout unquestionably overshadowed either of the double main events, although each one of these had plenty of action.

Jesse De Motte displayed marked ability at knocking out an opponent when he bowled over Earl Beebe, ambitious Portland youngster, in the third round of a scheduled six round fight. Fans are speculating on how De Motte and Earl Ritchie would go in a fast semi-windup or one side of a double main event.

Frankie Warneke and Spud Murphy put up a nice clean fight in the other half of the main event, but it lacked the fire and the punch of the semi-windup.

Jack Crim, hard hitting Modoc Indian, knocked "Steam Boat" Jackson cold in the fourth round with a left hook followed by a stinging right cross. Crim substituted for Indian Britt who broke his hand cracking an automobile. Pat McFadden challenges Crim to meet him on the next card. There is had blood between the two welters.

LAS COSTE AND BOROTRA BEAT TILDEN, HUNTER

PARIS, May 25, (AP)—Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter lost their first 1929 battle with their old French tennis rival today, losing to Jean Borotra and Rene La Coste in the semi-finals of the French doubles championships. The scores were 6-2, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3.

The smashing victory over America's first and second ranking stars assured an all-French final for the title as Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon eliminated the English team of J. C. Gregory and I. G. Collins earlier in the day in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4, 7-5.

Tilden and Hunter put up a good fight and managed to check their opponents' attack long enough to win the third set, but the younger team packed the greater endurance and came back with a rush that would not be denied.

CONCEDE EDGE IN TRACK MEET TO UNIVERSITY

EUGENE, Ore., May 25, (AP)—With the University athletes conceding the edge in the contest, Oregon and Oregon State college drew up their battle lines for their annual dual track and field meet here today. Oregon was regarded as having a clear advantage in the pole vault, discus, shot put, broad jump and mile. The State college had the best showing in the sprints, hurdles, javelin, high jump and mile relay.

Although by comparative scores Oregon State college appeared stronger, having lost to Washington by a closer score than did Oregon, the Aggies today were given but an outside chance of victory.

TILDEN PLANS TO RELINQUISH TENNIS CAREER

Big Bill Finally Decides He Has Had Enough Competition

NEW YORK, May 25, (AP)—Big Bill Tilden will bid fond adieu to international tennis competition after the current season is over, after ten years of serious tennis filled with dramatic victories and equally dramatic defeats. Big Bill finally has decided that he has had enough.

The lanky Philadelphia six times holder of the national title, bulwark for years of American Davis cup teams, a dominant figure season after season on foreign courts, announces his approaching retirement from international play in an article, written by himself in the June 1 issue of the magazine "Liberty."

Although ready to quit international competition, Big Bill disclaims emphatically any intention of quitting the game which he said he would play as "long as my two wabbling legs will function, my aged and creaking arm will swing, and my age-dimmed eyes can see a ball." The Philadelphia added that his status would continue to be amateur and that he had no thought of turning professional.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—Dr. Edwin F. Hedge, professor of economic geology at the University of Oregon, will leave early in the summer to do extensive exploration and study in the volcanic regions of Italy, Palestine and the Rift Valley of Africa. The geology of these regions is very similar to that of Oregon, and Dr. Hedge will make comparisons between the two. In this way, these foreign regions have been studied thoroughly for many years, so as to be able to arrive at conclusions about Oregon's geologic future, which will greatly aid in mining and similar enterprises.
