PHILADELPHIA WINS ANOTHER; NEW YORK WINS

Babe Ruth Cracks Out Ninth Home Run in Game Sunday

If the American only were composed of first the Senators and the Athletics, life would be nothing but a long, sweet dream for the hirelings of Prof. Cornelius McGillicuddy. The aspiring Mackmen have played at a .650 clip against the other six clubs, but have averaged a net .923 against Walter Johnson's party, which many picked to win the National pennant. Their record is 13 out of 20 against the league in general, 12 out of 13 against their Washington cousins.

The Athletics shifted the scene to the capital city yesterday to shade the Senators by 4 to 3 for the eleventh straight Philadelphia victory, nine of which have been at the expense of the self same Senators.

Four Ahead

The victory maintained the Athletics comfortably ahead of their field, four games in front of the Browns, who shaded Cleveland by 1 to 0, and five and one-half to the fore of the Yankees and the Tigers, who rested in a virtual tie for third place. Old Red Faber applied the one-hit treatment to the Tigers in Chicago to win by 2 to 0 as the Yankees went on a spree in Boston to half the Red Sox by 15 to 4.

Babe Ruth's ninth home run was the crowning blow in a 16-hit assault which the champions showered upon the Messrs. Ed Morris, Ed Durham, Ed Carroll, Billy Payne and Jack Russell. Waite Hoyt was doing very well with the New York pitching unit, but he became involved in a heated debate with Mr. Richard Nathan, the umpire, Hoyt spent the rest of the afternoon in the clubhouse wondering whether he would get credit for the pitching victory, which he did.

The game marked the first appearance of the Yankees upon Braves field, which the Red Sox use for Sunday games because of its advantage over the fenway in seating capacity.

St. Louis Wins

Rip Collins scattered 7 Indian hits to win over Willis Hudlin by 1 to 0 on only five safe blows by his St. Louis comrades. Blue's double and Manush's single in the eighth settled the argument, leaving the Browns in a threatening position.

The Pirates definitely inserted themselves into the National league fight, for the movement at any event, by taking both ends of a double header from the Cardinals at Sportsman's park. The scores were 12 and 8 and 7 to 5, with Burleigh Grimes stampeding to the aid of faltering Pittsburgh pitchers in each engagement. The Cubs, aided by a Hornsby home run, had little difficulty in turning back the Reds by 5 to 1 at Chicago.

Cubs Lead

The sabbath results in the National league left the Cubs leading the Cardinals by a margin of one full game, represented by a difference of two in the losing column—this in spite of two defeats in three days for the Bruins in St. Louis. The Pirates rested only one and one half games behind the Cubs, half a game to the rear of the champion Cardinals. The rest of the league remained below the .500 mark, despite the fifth successive victory of the Giants, who stopped the Braves by 15 to 3 at the polo grounds.

The Robins completed the National League program by cleaning up their third straight over the Phillies, 5 to 4.

Elks to Show Super Card at Big Conclave

A fight card whose main event will be championship caliber will be one of the features of the annual convention of the Elks lodge in Klamath Falls, July 17, 18, 19 and 20. Already plans are going forward on the match.

A request has been issued by the Elks committee in charge to ask fight fans who have ideas on what would be a good main event or semi-windup, to write to the sporting editor of the Evening Herald. From these letters the committee hopes to get a cross section of opinion on the question of what boys would be the best match.

The fight card will be held in the new Pelican theatre building and close to 2,000 will be seated—that includes 400 ringside seats on a \$6,000 house will be raised; enough to guarantee main event and semi-windup of first rate fighters. The main event alone would cost over \$2,000.

Among the various matches being considered is one between "Wildcat" Carter, sensational Negro flash and Baby Sal who recently fought a title match with Tod Morgan, a junior lightweight champion. Although Sal floored Morgan once and almost upset him a second time, he lost on points. Carter has fought Morgan and secured a draw. A good semi-windup fighter, for this super-card would be Walter Cleghorn, famous Eskimo Indian and a regular main event shot, who has fought two fast main events in Klamath Falls.

"We're going to put on a show here that will eclipse anything ever seen in Klamath Falls before," said Joe "Tex" Bickerstaff, who will take a leading part in arranging the fights. "Believe it or not, we're going to run a special fight train from Portland to attend this fight."

Western Days Re-enacted By Angry Cowboy

LEWISTON, Pa., May 27, (U P)—The only cowboy in America with real bullets in his gun wheeled his horse today and emptied the weapon into George Thomas, 26, a Negro buffalo herder of the 101 ranch wild west show here, when the buffalo herder had the temerity to snatch a riding quirt from his hand.

The streets of Tombstone, Arizona, in its palmiest days, never saw a better exhibition of flaring temper and marksmanship than was exhibited—according to the police—by Adolf Lehmann, an unaturalized German cowboy.

The bark of Adolph's pistol caused a wild dive for tents and other cover by other members of the wild west troupe, but Thomas was too slow. He was picked up as full of holes as one of Buffalo Bill's glass balls. With four bullet holes in his head and body he lay in a hospital tonight. Doctors believe he will die.

Adolph, the cowboy, put his gun back in its holster and surrendered to the police. He was stripped of his chaps and held without bail.

CHARGE SCHOOL WITH BUYING UP GRID ATHLETES

Big Ten Faculty Committee Takes Action Against University

IOWA CITY, Ia., May 27, (A P)—The University of Iowa today set about to put its athletic house in order, following its ouster from big ten conference competition on charges of subsidizing athletes.

After two years of disension, the university had rebuilt its athletic house only a month ago, when Prof. Paul E. Belting resigned as director. Just as E. H. Lauer, Belting's successor, was completing reorganization, the sudden action of the big ten faculty committee has disarranged the athletic department's plan.

Lauer and other university officials, however, are optimistic over the outcome. As they prepared a widespread investigation of the charges today, they expressed the belief that the ruling did not expel the school but merely severed relations after January 1, 1930. They indicated that relations might be resumed.

In a statement, Belting placed the blame for the ouster on President Walter A. Jessup, who, Belting said, had requested his resignation. Belting declared he had refused to divert funds to help athletes and added "I assume that the western conference interpreted the president's refusal to support me as a direct challenge to clean sport in the University of Iowa, and they acted accordingly. I think their judgment is correct."

Two hundred and fifty students left their cramming for final examinations last night to express opposition to Belting. They gathered on the campus with the avowed intention of rotten-egging the deposed director, but were dispersed by Lauer and George T. Bresnahan, track coach and new supervisor of intercollegiate athletics.

The decision will enable Iowa, which was ousted by the conference faculty committee on a charge of subsidizing its athletes, to complete its six game schedule in football next fall against big ten rivals, its opponents are Ohio state, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Purdue and Michigan.

Major Griffith said all these games would be recognized by the conference and, that should Iowa win it would be recognized as big ten champion.

OREGON STATE BADLY BEATEN BY UNIVERSITY

HAYWARD FIELD, Eugene, Ore., May 27, (UP)—University of Oregon defeated Oregon State College, 23 to 26, in a dual track and field meet here Saturday.

The Webfoot captured 10 first places and tied for two out of a possible 15 places.

The victory today by Oregon marks the first in several seasons over the Beavers.

The outstanding event of the meet was the 100-yard dash won by Tyrrell Lowry of Oregon, who stepped the distance in .13, equaling the 1929 northwest records of Pendleton of Washington and Foster of Washington State.

Because of the lack of sprinters, who had not already worn themselves out in previous events, Bill Hayward, Oregon coach, conceded the mile relay to Oregon State.

WASHINGTON, May 27, (UP)—The United States teams have eliminated Japan in the American zone semi-finals of the Davis Cup tennis tournament.

John Van Ryn clinched the tournament for the American team by winning his match with Tami Abe easily by a score of 3 to 1.

The victory of the American team over Japan gives it the right to meet Cuba in the American zone finals at Detroit next month.
