CONDITIONS IN KLAMATH ARE FOUND BETTER

Prohibition Chief Sees Marked Improvement Since Last Visit

High praise for Klamath Falls, Klamath county and federal and state officers located in this district was given last night by Roy C. Lyle, federal prohibition administrator for Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

Mr. Lyle, with W. K. Newell, federal prohibition administrator for Oregon, returned from Lakeview last night, where they surveyed conditions and today plan to continue north to their headquarters.

"Officers in this district, both local, county, state and federal, are to be commended for their efficiency," Mr. Lyle said. "Mr. Newell is also to be praised for his work in Oregon," he added.

"Conditions here are much better than when I visited in this section previously," Mr. Lyle stated.

He thanked the newspapers in Klamath for their co-operation and aid in connection with his department.

Maurice Smith, assistant to Mr. Lyle, accompanied the administrator on his visit to this section. George Alexander, whom Mr. Lyle also commended for his enforcement work and who accompanied the federal officers to Klamath county, entered the Northwest Trapshoot here Friday but was forced to return to Portland hurriedly when he received word by telegram that his mother was seriously ill.

Federal officers here are Clarence Worden and Louis Mueller. Leigh M. Ackerman is stationed here from the state department. Local officers who were given praise are Chief of Police Keith Ambrose and County Sheriff Lloyd L. Low.

The Great Northern railroad to build southward through Oregon and connect up with the Western Pacific network. The commission will announce its decision on the report after further hearings.

"The Joaquin Valley is traversed by three or more parallel lines of railroad, owned by two actively competing systems, the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe," Davis' report said in recommending that the commission reject the Western Pacific's contemplated extension.

"The Western Pacific line proposed, paralleling them, would nowhere be more than 6 miles from the main line of the Southern Pacific, it would reach no towns that are not served by existing railways and would not provide better or cheaper routes to any market. Evidence indicates that the saving would be very small in proportion to the cost of providing additional railroad service.

"Testimony concerning the needs of the Western Pacific does not justify such inherently wasteful paralleling or existing railways. The commission should find that the present and future public convenience and necessity is not shown to require such construction and the application should be denied."

The commission will afford opportunity for argument and further hearing before announcing its final decision.
