PIRATES CLUB THEIR WAY TO SECOND PLACE

Lead of Philadelphia Athletics Cut One Half Game

Gaining momentum day by day, the ferocious Pirates of Pittsburgh had clubbed their way into second place in the National League pennant race today, with the pace setting position only a bare half game away.

With Jess Petty on the mound for them yesterday, the Corsairs pounded out a 10 to 1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals, relegated the Cards to third place in the standings and saw first place only a half game distant when the Chicago Cubs obligingly lost to Cincinnati.

Rally Beats Cubs
The Cubs fell victim to a six run rally in the eighth at Cincinnati and dropped the decision, 5 to 5, much to the delight of the Reds who had lost nine consecutive games. Sheriff Blake handcuffed the Reds effectively enough until the 8th when they drove him from the box and continued the assault on Charley Root and Claude Jonnard.

Good pitching by Ray Bengtson and Claude Willoughby gave the Phillies both ends of a double bill with the Boston Braves, 2 to 1 and 3 to 1. Bob Smith lost the first game by passing Barney Friberg with the bases filled in the sixth. Willoughby had a shut-out in his grasp in the nightcap until George Harper hit a homer in the ninth.

A's Lead Cut
Over in the American League, the St. Louis Browns shaved a half game off the Philadelphia Athletics' lead by downing Cleveland, 3 to 1. George Blasholder kept eight Cleveland hits scattered and won his second victory of the six game series of which the Browns took four. A passed ball and an error, coupled with ten Brown safeties, sent Walter Miller, Indian southpaw, down to defeat.

The Chicago White Sox surprised with a double victory over Buck Harris' Detroit Tigers, 7 to 4, and 6 to 5 in 14 innings. The Sox pulled the first game out of the fire with a four run rally in the eighth and came from behind to take second as well. Detroit led in the nightcap, 3 to 1 after seven innings of play but the Sox scored single runs in

the eighth and ninth to knot the count, scored another in the 12th and 13th frames to match Detroit counters and won out in the 14th.

All other major league clubs had an off day.

PESEK DEFEATS G. WALKER BY USING SCIENCE

Nebraskan Sidesteps Flying Tackle Then Takes Fall

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28, (AP)—John Pesek, Nebraska heavyweight wrestler, gave one of the cleverest and most scientific exhibitions of wrestling here last night when he defeated George Walker, Canadian heavy, in one fall in 21 minutes, 36 seconds. Walker really defeated himself when, in an effort to emulate the football flying tactics of Gus Sonnenberg, he shot headlong through the ropes, skinned across the three-foot outer staging, tumbled over the edge and down four feet onto the concrete pavement of the auditorium floor. He was plainly hurt, but after a five minute respite, gamely climbed back into the ring where it was an easy matter for Pesek to throw him with an airplane spin. Walker was unable to continue after the intermission.

ANDRE ROUTIS KAYOES BROWN IN 3RD ROUND

BALTIMORE, Md., May 28, (UP)—Andre Routis of France successfully defended his world featherweight championship here last night by knocking out Buster Brown of Baltimore in the third round of a scheduled 15-round bout. Brown's seconds threw in the towel after he had been down twice for counts of six and seven.

GAVUZZI CUTS DOWN LEAD OF BUNION LEADER

EL PASO, Tex., May 28, (UP)—Pete Gavuzzi, bewhiskered Italian, cut 34 minutes from the lead of Johnny Salo, Passaic, N. J., policeman, today in the fifty-eighth lap of C. C. Pyle's bunton derby. Gavuzzi finished in the 20 mile grid from Fabens to El Paso, making the distance in 3:23:40.

Salo ran fifth today, and his lead margin was reduced to 43 minutes and 30 seconds.

Herbert Hedeman, of New York, oldest man in the race, tied with Sam Richman, of New York, for second today. Guisto Umek, of Italy, was fourth in 3:56:00.

Tuesday the bunioneers move from Texas after a 15-day stay, heading for Lea Cruces, New Mexico, 50 miles distant.

OREGON TITLE AT STAKE IN BALL SERIES

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 28, (AP)—A two-game series to determine the state collegiate baseball championship, and which may have a bearing on the championship of the northern division of the Pacific coast conference, was to open here today with Oregon State college and the University of Oregon crossing bats. The final game will be played in Eugene tomorrow.

Washington State college tops the list in the northern division, with two games yet to be played with University of Washington. Oregon State is second in the conference race with a percentage of .571.
